CBSE Results: Noida region's CBSE pass rate dips, lags behind national avg

New Delhi: Noida: The Noida region witnessed a decline in the pass percentage this year, lagging behind the national average after the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) declared the results on Wednesday.

While the national pass percentage saw an increase of 0.04 percentage points, Noida region witnessed a drop from 89.41% in 2025 to 87.66% this year.

The region recorded a pass percentage of 87.66%, lower than the national average of 93.70%, and was ranked 20th among 22 regions, indicating a decline in its overall performance.

According to CBSE data, over 313,000 students were registered from the Noida region, of whom around 310,000 appeared for the examination. The region covers multiple districts in western Uttar



Pradesh, including Gautam Budh Nagar, Ghaziabad, Meerut, Agra, Aligarh and Bulandshahr.

Despite the regional dip, there were some individual brilliance performances as well.

In Ghaziabad, Daksh Vasudeva, a student of Amity School, Sector 6,

Vasundhara, scored perfect score of 100%. "Scoring 500 out of 500 is a big achievement. He has always been a consistent performer since nursery, and now he is preparing for JEE," said his mother Shilpa Vasudeva.

"We are elated with our students' performance this year, with the school topper

achieving 99.2%. Several students also scored a perfect 100 in subjects such as German, Social Science and Sanskrit. While many are satisfied with their results, some students are considering appearing for the upcoming improvement exams in May to further enhance their scores," said

Dr. Gita Joshi, principal of Silverline Prestige School, Ghaziabad.

In Gautam Budh Nagar district, at Delhi Public School, Noida, Tanvi Caroli who secured an aggregate of 99.4%, said, "I wasn't expecting less than 98%. Scoring this much feels like a surprise."

Rina Singh, principal at the Ramagya School, Sector 50, Noida, which reported its highest aggregate of 99.6%, said that over 51% of students scored above 90%, while 22% students scored above 95%.

At Shiv Nadar School, Noida, the pass percentage stood at 100%, with top scores of 99% secured by Reet Narula and Gauransh Kaul. The school reported 49 students scoring above 90%. The school's principal, Anju Soni, said, "Their focus, resilience and hard work have brought laurels to the school."

Trishar Das of Amity International School, Noida, who secured an overall aggregate of 99.6%, said, "I think maintaining a positive mindset during the exam really helped me improve my results."

Lok Sabha's strength to go up to 815, 272 of these for women; no state will suffer: Meghwal

New Delhi: The strength of the Lok Sabha will increase to 815, of which 272 seats will be reserved for women and neither men nor any state will suffer any loss due to the implementation of this quota, Union Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal said on Thursday.

In his introductory remarks in the Lok Sabha on the three bills moved to amend the women's quota law and set up a delimitation commission, Meghwal also said that 272 seats out of 815 in the House is the simple formula of reserving 33 per cent seats for women. "According to the women's reservation bill, the strength of the Lok Sabha will increase to 815, of which women's quota will be of 272 seats," the minister said. According to the proposed legislations, there will be an increase of 50 per cent in the current strength of the Lok Sabha. "Neither men nor any state will suffer any loss after the implementation of the women's quota," he said.

Meghwal also said that there will be reservation for women belonging to SC and ST categories within the women's quota in the Lok Sabha and state assemblies.

New Delhi: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Thursday asserted that his government is resolutely moving forward for empowerment of women in the three-day special sitting of Parliament.

His remarks came ahead of the start of the special sitting during which the 'Nari Shakti Vandan Adhinyam', commonly known as Women Reservation Act, will be amended for its implementation in 2029.

"In the special sitting of Parliament, beginning today, our country is all set to take a historic step towards women's empowerment. The respect for our mothers and sisters is the respect for the nation, and with this very spirit, we are moving forward resolutely in this direction," Modi said in a post on X in Hindi.

Delhi L-G Sandhu reviews fire service, calls for effective emergency response

New Delhi: Delhi Lieutenant Governor Taranjit Singh Sandhu on Thursday reviewed the functioning of the Delhi Fire Service and directed officials to heighten vigilance for effective emergency response. In a post on X, the L-G said the focus of the review was modernisation, infrastructure upgrades, and strengthening personnel capacity of the Delhi Fire Service (DFS) to enhance its emergency response system. He also examined the proposed amendments to the Delhi Fire Service Rules, 2010, and emphasised the need for broad-based public consultations with residents, businessmen and traders to ensure that the framework is inclusive, practical and effective.

Three Major Reform Bills including Union Territories Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026 Introduced in Lok Sabha

New Delhi: Union Law Minister Arjun Meghwal introduced the Constitution (One Hundred and Thirty-First Amendment) Bill, 2026, and the Delimitation Bill, 2026, in Lok Sabha today. Home Minister Amit Shah introduced the Union Territories Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026, in the House.

Introducing the Bills, Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal termed the day as historic, saying the government is working to give political justice to women. He said the Constitution (One Hundred and Thirty-First Amendment) Bill, 2026, will ensure equality for women. Quoting Dr BR Ambedkar, Mr Meghwal stressed that the progress of a community is measured by the degree of progress which women have achieved. He said the time for the reservation of 33 per cent seats is here now.

The Law Minister said that to implement a uniform and legally consistent distribution of reserved seats

for women across the country, it would be necessary to increase the total number of seats in the Lok Sabha by 50 percent over the current strength. He added that with such an increase, the new strength of the Lok Sabha would be 815 members. He said that out of these, 272 seats would be reserved for women, which comes in addition to the existing allocation. Mr Meghwal said that this formula ensures that no group suffers any loss, and the relative strength of each state will remain unchanged in the future.

The Law Minister said that the results of Census 2027 are not expected to be available before the end of 2027 or the beginning of 2028. He informed that, therefore, the 2011 Census will be used for the readjustment or division of territorial constituencies and for the allocation of seats for Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. He said this has also been clearly stated in the

objectives of the Bill. Mr Meghwal said the Narendra Modi government has brought a number of schemes for the economic and social upliftment of women. He cited MUDRA Yojana, Lakhpati Didis and Sukanya Samridhhi Yojana as among the schemes brought by the government.

Opening the discussion on the Bills for the Opposition, Congress MP Gaurav Gogoi said his party is in favour of women's reservation, but it should be simplified and not linked with delimitation. He said the reservation should be based on the existing 543 seats in the Lok Sabha. He alleged that the government is creating unnecessary delays in implementing the women's reservation and urged the government to bring it into force immediately.

Mr Gogoi reiterated that Congress has consistently supported women's reservation. He highlighted that senior Congress leader Sonia

Gandhi had earlier made a similar demand in Parliament, emphasising reservation for women.

Tejasvi Surya of BJP said that today is a historic day as the women of the country, who have been waiting for nearly four decades, are now set to receive their due share. He said, by introducing three new bills, the Narendra Modi government is fast-tracking the Women's Reservation bills.

Mr Surya said, the move is being seen as a significant step towards opening a new chapter in India's development journey. He emphasised that, for the first time, the Nari Shakti of the country will receive vocal, visible, credible, and tangible representation in the nation-building process.

The discussion is underway.

Earlier, the Opposition members in the Lok Sabha had pressed for a division against the move to introduce the bills. After

use of vote slips, Speaker Om Birla announced that there were 251 AYES and 185 NOES.

Congress MP KC Venugopal had opposed the introduction of the Bills, alleging that these will undermine the federal structure of the country. Home Minister Amit Shah strongly rebutted that Mr Venugopal can raise only technical objections to the introduction of the Bill but cannot speak on the merits of bills. Samajwadi Party MP Akhilesh Yadav questioned the necessity to bring the Bills in such a hurried manner, saying that Census should be done first.

Home Minister Amit Shah replied that the process of Census has begun and the government has already taken the decision to conduct the caste census. TMC's Kakoli Ghosh Dastidar opposed the introduction of the Bills saying women's reservation is being made dependent on future delimitation exercise.

When the House assembled, Lok Sabha paid tribute to legendary playback singer Asha Bhosle, who passed away in Mumbai, at the age of 92. Paying tributes, Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla said that the remarkable career spanning more than seven decades, she made an invaluable contribution to Indian cinema and music.

Mr Birla said, Asha Bhosle lent her voice to songs in numerous Indian and foreign languages, earning immense popularity and admiration. He said, in recognition of her outstanding contributions, she was honoured with the Dadasaheb Phalke Award in 2000 and the Padma Vibhushan in 2008.

The House also paid obituary references to the passing away of its Abu Hasem Khan Choudhury, Mohsina Kidwai and Hari Narayan Rajbhar. Members of the House also observed silence as a mark of respect to the memory of the departed.

Uda Pata Parva, festival of Pain for betterment observed



Keonjhar: 'Uda Pata Parva', an age-old festival in Keonjhar district, was observed in different areas on Tuesday, on the eve of 'Pana Sankranti'. The festival is observed mostly in the tribal community, where participants inflict various pains upon themselves to fulfill their desires and for the betterment of the community while worshipping their deities. Thousands of people witness the festival in Poipani village, Mushakhori, Kesdurapal, Jyotipur and other areas in Keonjhar district. This festival is famous in Thakurmunda in Mayurbhanj district.

According to their old belief, they sacrifice blood to appease the deities after fulfilling their desires by piercing their bodies with nails attached to a thread. Some offer cocks and goats on this day to satisfy the deity.

"During this day the devotees take part in the festival and rituals of the deities while fasting. On this day, they pierce their bodies with sharp nails attached to a thread or tie themselves to a round wooden swing with a cloth above the ground and fly," said Hrushikesh Mohanta of Poipani village.

According to the local people 'Uda' literally means 'flying', hence the local people

called it "Uda Pata Parva". To fulfill their desire as well as to express their gratitude to the local deities that 'Maa Basuli' after fulfillment of their desires, the devotee adopt such painful means.

From the river bed after worshipped the deity 'Maa Basuli' and offering blood with piercing the nail attach with thread in their body and hand, they move to the worship place. They were pulled with the thread and taken to the temple in swinging down position. There they were tied with in a wood of a circular swing and the swing moves around with the beat of bands, 'Ghanta' and 'Huluhuli' to cheer up them.

Apart from these painful practices, a number of cultural activities including open-stage opera, 'palla,' 'Daskathia,' folk dance and songs take place. The crowd enjoyed the whole night there. Additionally, the Mela provides an opportunity for tribal young men and women to choose their marriage mates.

Alekh Patra, a retired officer, said, "In this era of the internet and cinema, this hundred-year-old tradition continues. The government should take the initiative to protect and promote it to attract more tourists these days."

CM Majhi's Assurance in Barbil Sparks Renewed Optimism for the Barbil - banspani 'Missing Link'

Keonjhar: Barbil Bikash Parishad and civil society groups submitted a memorandum to Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi on April 13 during his visit to Barbil, demanding the 17 km length Banspani-Barbil rail link.

The CM laid the foundation stone for the much-awaited ₹1,581 crore Barbil Bypass-cum-Ring Road and inaugurated dozens of other projects worth hundreds of crores. During that time local people's groups submitted a detailed memorandum that prominently featured the rail project.

In response, Majhi assured residents that the Banspani-Barbil rail link "will be done very soon," that injecting fresh hope into a proposal.

According to sources, the Barbil-Banspani link, a small but critical "missing link" project in North Odisha's mineral-rich belt that would connect the mineral-rich Barbil station directly to Banspani station (Joda). Currently, mineral and passenger carrying trains cover an extra 60-70 km more through Jharkhand territory because of this small missing link.

For passengers, it will slash travel time on services like the Puri-Barbil Intercity; for freight, it would dramatically improve the movement of iron ore and other minerals from the Barbil-Joda mining hub to steel plants in Kalinganagar, Angul, Rourkela, and ports such as Paradip and Dhamra.

"This project was

identified many years ago. Decades of Delay, Strong Economic Case: First identified in the 2016-17 Railway Budget and later taken up by the Odisha Rail Infrastructure Development Limited (ORIDL), the project received in-principle approval from the Railway Board for pre-investment activities (surveys and DPR preparation). A draft Detailed Project Report (DPR) was prepared, estimating the cost at around ₹433 crore. Final Location Surveys were completed years ago, yet full sanction and construction funding have remained elusive" said Basant Kumar Mohanta, a member of the citizen forum in Barbil.

According to the memorandum, the project has since been merged into the larger

Barbil-Bimlagarh-Rourkela Steel Corridor package — a 198.73 km network of new lines and doublings with a total estimated cost of ₹12,479.84 crore. "According to South Eastern Railway (SER) Monthly Confidential Demi-Official (MCDO) reports from late 2025, this package boasts a Financial Internal Rate of Return (FIRR) of 11.05% and an exceptionally strong Economic Internal Rate of Return (EIRR) of 26.54%. Such high FIRR figures—driven primarily by massive transport cost savings on iron ore and coal, time efficiencies, accident reduction, and induced industrial growth—underscore the project's socio-economic viability far beyond typical railway benchmarks" member of Barbil

Bikash Parishad mentioned.

Odisha, India's leading steel-producing state with a current capacity exceeding 40 MTPA and an ambitious target of over 130 MTPA by 2030, relies heavily on efficient mineral evacuation. The Barbil-Banspani link and the broader Steel Corridor are seen as essential enablers for this growth, reducing logistics costs, decongesting existing lines, and supporting green steel initiatives by lowering emissions through rail over road transport.

Including other demands the local citizens of Barbil Bikash Parishad not only reiterated the rail link demand but also pressed for restarting the Barbil-Puri Intercity train and other connectivity improvements. Activists and residents have long

highlighted how the current detour hampers daily life and economic activity in this mining-affected region.

The CM's public assurance during the visit—coinciding with major road infrastructure announcements—signals growing political recognition of these long-pending issues.

This comes amid a broader push for rail development in Odisha, including record allocations in the Union Budget 2026-27 and ongoing SER proposals. However, the project's shift from an ORIDL-funded model (with 100% state funding initially envisaged) to a participative Steel Corridor framework involving mining companies and SER reflects evolving funding strategies. Although surveys are complete

and a combined DPR has been with the Railway Board since 2023 (with updates in 2025), land acquisition and full financial clearance remain the next critical steps.

CM Majhi's words on 13 April 2026 have given the project renewed momentum and revived the hope of local people. For the people of Barbil and North Odisha's mining communities, the message is clear: after years of advocacy, the short rail link that could redefine regional connectivity may finally be on the fast track. The coming months will test whether this optimism translates into tangible progress, such as land acquisition notices, budget allocations, or a formal sanction, local people said. (EOM)

IMD Issues Heatwave Alert for 10 Odisha Districts as Temperatures Set to Rise

Bhubaneswar, 16 April (H.S.): The intense summer heat continues to grip Odisha, with the India Meteorological Department (IMD) warning of a further rise in day temperatures by 2 to 3 degrees Celsius over the next two days.

The Regional Meteorological Centre in Bhubaneswar has issued a heatwave alert for several districts located in the western and interior parts of the state. The districts under alert include Bolangir, Bargarh, Jharsuguda, Sundargarh, Deogarh, Angul, Boudh, Kandhamal, Sonepur, and Sambalpur.

According to the weather department, heatwave conditions are expected to intensify in these regions, prompting



authorities to urge residents to take precautionary measures. The advisory highlights the need to avoid prolonged exposure to direct sunlight, remain hydrated, and take necessary steps to prevent heat-related illnesses.

In addition to rising temperatures, coastal districts are likely to experience high humidity levels over the next seven days. The combination of heat and humidity is expected to make weather conditions increasingly

uncomfortable, adding to the overall stress on residents.

Manorama Mohanty, Director of the Bhubaneswar Meteorological Centre, stated that temperatures are likely to increase further in the coming days. She

emphasized that humid conditions would persist in coastal areas, while interior districts would continue to experience heatwave conditions.

The IMD has reiterated its advisory for residents in the affected districts, particularly Bolangir, Bargarh, Jharsuguda, Sundargarh, Deogarh, Angul, Boudh, Kandhamal, and Sonepur, to remain cautious and take preventive steps to cope with the extreme weather.

With the heatwave conditions expected to persist, authorities are closely monitoring the situation and have urged the public to follow safety guidelines to minimize health risks during the ongoing spell of extreme heat.

Odisha Launches Statewide Door-to-Door Digital Census Drive

Bhubaneswar, 16 April (H.S.): Odisha on Thursday launched a comprehensive door-to-door digital census, marking a major administrative initiative aimed at collecting detailed demographic data across the state. The exercise will continue until May 15, with authorities deploying a large workforce to ensure accurate and efficient data collection.

More than 90,000 officials have been engaged in the enumeration process, visiting households to gather information. To supervise the operation, 15,140 supervisors have been appointed. Primary school teachers have been assigned the role of enumerators, while high school teachers are functioning as supervisors to oversee field activities.

Each enumerator has been tasked with collecting data on approximately 800 individuals. On average, an official is expected to cover 150 to 200 households during the one-month exercise. In addition to data collection, officials will also carry out house listing and numbering,



while interacting with the head of each household to record responses.

The census will include a structured questionnaire comprising 33 questions. These questions cover a wide range of socio-economic indicators, including the type of housing and construction materials used, food habits of households, and ownership of assets such as two-wheelers and four-wheelers.

Prior to the full-scale enumeration, officials have been allotted a three-day preparatory period for mapping activities. During this phase, they will identify their assigned areas,

familiarize themselves with local conditions, and estimate the number of houses and families. This groundwork is scheduled to continue until April 18.

The actual enumeration process will commence on April 19 following the completion of the mapping phase. All data collected during the exercise will be recorded digitally, ensuring streamlined processing, improved accuracy, and easy accessibility for administrative planning and policy formulation.

Officials stated that the digital approach is expected to enhance transparency and efficiency, making the census a key step toward data-driven governance in the state.

Former Nuapada District Labour Officer Convicted in Bribery Case, Sentenced to 3 Years

Bhubaneswar, 16 April (H.S.): In a corruption case, former District Labour Officer (DLO) of Nuapada, Sarat Kumar Panigrahi, has been convicted and sentenced to three years of simple imprisonment by a vigilance court.

According to official sources, the verdict was delivered on April 16, 2026, by the Hon'ble Special Judge, Vigilance, Bhawanipatna. The court also imposed a fine of ₹80,000 on the convicted retired official.



Panigrahi, who served as District Labour Officer at Khariar Road in Nuapada district, was charge-sheeted

by Odisha Vigilance in connection with Koraput Vigilance Police Station Case No. 3 dated January 7, 2021.

He was booked under Section 7(a) of the Prevention of Corruption (Amendment) Act, 2018.

The case pertained to allegations that he had demanded and accepted a bribe of ₹40,000 from a trainer for facilitating the registration of 200 labourers. Following the conviction, vigilance authorities stated that steps will be taken to initiate proceedings for stoppage of pension benefits of the retired officer, subject to approval from the competent authority.

Class 8 Student Found Hanging in Odisha Hostel, Probe Underway

Bhubaneswar, 16 April (H.S.): A Class 8 student was found hanging inside a school hostel in Umerkote area of Odisha's Nabarangpur district on Thursday, triggering shock and concern among locals and authorities.

The deceased has been identified as 12-year-old Prashant Bhatra, son of Parameswar Bhatra of Badakumari village. He was a student of Bhamini Ashram School under Umerkote block.

According to initial

reports, the student had returned to the hostel from his home just two days before the incident. He was found hanging inside the hostel premises under circumstances that are yet to be ascertained.

On receiving information, police reached the spot, recovered the body, and initiated an investigation. Officials stated that the exact cause of death is still unclear, and all possible angles are being examined.

The incident has raised serious concerns over the safety and supervision of students in residential school hostels. Locals have questioned how such an incident could occur without the knowledge of school authorities, including the headmaster and hostel warden.

Authorities have assured a thorough probe into the matter, and further action will be taken based on the findings of the investigation.

Dawn-to-Dusk Bandh Disrupts Normal Life in Odisha's Birmaharajpur

Bhubaneswar, 16 April (H.S.): Normal life was significantly disrupted in Birmaharajpur area of Odisha's Sonepur district on Thursday as a 12-hour bandh was observed following tensions over an alleged incident during an Ambedkar procession.

The shutdown, enforced from 6 am to 6 pm, was called by Bajrang Dal and Vishva Hindu Parishad after claims emerged that a photograph of Lord Shri Ram was torn during a procession held on Wednesday. The incident reportedly triggered strong reactions, leading to the call for the bandh.

The impact of the shutdown was widespread across the town. Shops and commercial establishments remained closed, while both



government and private offices suspended operations. Educational institutions also remained shut for the day. Vehicular movement was severely affected, with roads largely deserted and public transport operating minimally.

Members of Bajrang Dal

staged picketing at multiple locations to enforce the bandh, contributing to the near-complete shutdown of normal activities. Residents largely stayed indoors, and only essential movement was reported during the day.

Authorities maintained strict vigilance to prevent any

escalation of tensions. Police personnel were deployed at sensitive locations across Birmaharajpur to ensure law and order. Officials confirmed that security arrangements were intensified, and continuous monitoring was carried out to avoid any untoward incidents.

Despite the disruption,

essential services were kept under close watch to ensure that there were no major inconveniences to the public. Law enforcement agencies coordinated efforts to maintain peace and stability in the region.

Condemning the alleged act, organisers demanded strict action against those responsible for hurting religious sentiments. A case has been registered at the local police station, and an investigation is currently underway.

Local residents also expressed support for the bandh, stating that the incident had deeply hurt public sentiments. Authorities have urged people to remain calm and cooperate with the administration as the investigation progresses.

Delimitation Furore

THE Centre's proposed delimitation exercise has caused a furore in Opposition-ruled states, particularly in South India. The Union government's plan to use the 2011 Census as the basis for reallocating Lok Sabha seats has triggered fears that the federal balance could tilt in favour of highly populous states in the Hindi heartland. Opposition parties have reiterated that they fully support women's reservation; their grouse is that it's being used as a pretext to aggravate inequality among states. Tamil Nadu Chief Minister MK Stalin and his Telangana counterpart A Revanth Reddy have accused the Centre of exploiting the demographic arithmetic to undermine cooperative federalism.

The necessity of greater representation for women in Parliament and Assemblies cannot be disputed. However, the proposed linkage between the implementation of women's reservation and delimitation — and that too based on a 15-year-old Census — is fraught with complications. Hasty redrawing of parliamentary constituencies without thorough deliberations can only deepen Centre-State mistrust. The timing — right in the middle of an election cycle — is questionable too.

The principle of "one person, one vote, one value" must be balanced against the realities of India's development trajectory. Southern states, which have historically invested in population control, education and public health, now find themselves at risk of being penalised for their performance. Kerala CM Pinarayi Vijayan has rightly questioned whether such an approach sends a dangerous message: that governance and demographic discipline may lead to diminished political influence. Delimitation is essentially a political act with far-reaching consequences. If pursued without sensitivity to regional balance, it risks widening the north-south divide and eroding trust in the Union's fairness. There is a dire need to reconcile representation with equity, ensuring that India's diversity remains its strength, not its fault line. A simple, viable solution would be to provide 33 per cent reservation to women on the basis of the existing strength of Parliament.

Name Deletion

THE clock is ticking for lakhs of people whose appeals against the deletion of their names from West Bengal's electoral rolls are pending in appellate tribunals. The Supreme Court has refused to issue directions allowing aggrieved residents to vote, saying that their petition is "premature" and they must exhaust their remedies before the appellate authorities. The tribunals have their work cut out as two-phase polling will be held in the state on April 23 and 29.

From the outset, the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in the state has been marked by a bitter confrontation between the ruling Trinamool Congress (TMC) and the Election Commission of India (ECI). The entire exercise has been under judicial scrutiny over the past few months amid allegations of "politically motivated" deletions of voters' names. The onus is on the tribunals to expedite the adjudication process.

Even though many claims have already been dealt with, the scale of omissions and the anxiety among affected voters cannot be dismissed lightly. The right to vote, as the apex court noted, is not merely constitutional but deeply "sentimental" — a marker of belonging and citizenship. When individuals fear disenfranchisement or, worse, detention, the issue transcends procedural technicalities. Transparency in deletions and swift disposal of appeals are essential to ensure that no eligible voter is left out.

Making matters worse, the Centre-State conflict has not remained confined to the SIR row. The arrest of Vinesh Chandel, co-founder of the Indian Political Action Committee (IPAC) — a consultancy firm working for the TMC — by the Enforcement Directorate in a money-laundering case has emerged as a new flashpoint. With political tensions mounting by the day, free and fair polls in Bengal hinge on the credibility of Central institutions and the cooperation of the state authorities.

geopolitical participation, and the political economic dynamics throws new challenges to the energy markets and world's security infrastructure.

NATO today is a divided house. The other sensitive areas are river, sea waterways like the Panama canal, the Suez canal, the Red Sea are future choke points that only highlights the fragility of global systems. It puts question on the efficacy of the UN system and its failure to guard world peace. The Strait of Hormuz, that narrow passage of water is the centre of attraction over oil and nobody knows whether it is going to be cause of intensified pressure and power politics.

Why is it so? The energy concern is that despite talk of climate risk, Paris agreement, oil consumption is on increase. The pace of consumption outpaces the production. There is limited discovery of oil. The way the population is rising, the world has added a sizable population that is having an exponential growth. Coal, oil, and natural gas, are going to be depleted. But our standard of living requires it more and more. Now developing nations consume more and the result of use of fossil fuels has been at the centre of development and all human necessities.

The discovery of oil was a crucial turning point in human

history. The energy transition from coal to fossil fuels in the 20th century was a charismatic journey of oil. In 21st century the oil became a robust economic engine. On the eve of formation of OPEC, the oil cartel, the world faced a major challenge. But the international settlement making it linked to dollars, called the petrodollar, was a powerful change. In the international oil payment settlement system, dollar became the king and oil purchase or sell took place with dollar only therefore, the story of oil after 1973 is intrinsically intertwined with dollar and the growth of American economy. There lies the crux of the matter and why Trump attacked Venezuela and made Maduro a prisoner in American prison.

Why Current AI Falls Short

3. Multitasking and

Emerging Breakthroughs
Recent developments highlight how closely AI and neuroscience are converging:

Scientists have trained living neurons to perform computations, opening doors to hybrid biological-AI systems.

New AI architectures are being designed to adapt like the human brain, potentially leading to more general intelligence.

At the same time, challenges such as AI "hallucinations" show how far we still are from true

understanding.

The Road Ahead: Toward Human-Level AI
To build stronger AI, researchers are moving toward Neuro AI—a fusion of neuroscience, cognitive science, and artificial intelligence. This approach aims to create systems that:

Supreme Court Refuses Hearing on Mandatory Voting Petition

New Delhi, 16/4(H.S.):The Supreme Court declined to entertain a plea seeking compulsory voting for all voters nationwide. A bench led by Chief Justice Suryakant ruled it a policy matter beyond judicial purview, directing petitioner Ajay Goyal to approach competent authorities. The petition demanded directives enforcing voting mandates and barring non-voters from government benefits. CJI Suryakant questioned enforcement feasibility: "In a rule-of-law democracy, voters should cast ballots voluntarily through awareness campaigns—not court-



ordered arrests." He highlighted practical hurdles: Justice Bagchi traveling to West Bengal on workdays, or impoverished

workers prioritizing earnings over polls. "We cannot compel participation," the bench affirmed.

Saket Court Issues Notice to TMC MP Mahua Moitra Over Varanasi Iftar Controversy

New Delhi, 16 /4 (H.S.):Delhi's Saket Court has summoned Trinamool Congress MP Mahua Moitra in a case stemming from her social media post on an Iftar party held on a boat in Varanasi's Ganga River. Additional Sessions Judge Sonu Agnihotri issued the notice while hearing a revision petition challenging a magistrate's refusal to register an FIR against her; next hearing is May 16. Final-year law student Ram Pravesh Dubey filed the revision after the Judicial Magistrate First Class (JMFC) dismissed his March 30 plea seeking FIR under Bharatiya



Nyaya Sanhita sections 196(1) (prejudicial to national integration), 197(1)(c) 299 (outraging religious feelings),

and 353(1)(b) (spreading rumours).Dubey alleged Moitra's March 19 X post—questioning arrests of 14 Muslim men for the March 15 Iftar event where non-veg waste was allegedly discarded in the river—hurt his religious sentiments, aimed to incite communal discord, and stoke anti-Muslim bias. The JMFC ruled no prima facie case existed, finding no evidence Moitra's statement disrupted social harmony, insulted religious beliefs, or incited inter-community offences. "No cause to proceed further," the order stated, lacking records of actual disharmony.

Key agreements, including one on food security, were inked to deepen ties across trade, investment, technology, and global issues. External Affairs Minister Dr. S. Jaishankar and Commerce & Industry Minister Piyush Goyal attended the meeting. Earlier, Christian Stocker paid floral tribute at Rajghat, commemorating Mahatma Gandhi's legacy of peace, non-violence, and global harmony. Foreign Ministry spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal noted on X that the Chancellor reflected on Bapu's timeless ideals during the poignant visit.

Women's Quota Bills Spark Fierce Debate in Parliament

New Delhi, 16 /4 (H.S.):Three pivotal bills advancing women's reservation in Parliament were tabled Wednesday during a special session, igniting immediate opposition backlash. Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal introduced the Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill, 2026, and the Delimitation Bill, 2026, while Home Minister Amit Shah presented the Union Territories Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026. Congress leader K.C. Venugopal accused the government of attempting to "hijack the Constitution." Samajwadi Party MP Dharmendra Yadav demanded quotas for Muslim women, deeming the laws meaningless otherwise; Akhilesh Yadav echoed this, questioning provisions for half the population. Shah retorted sharply, deeming religion-based reservations unconstitutional and suggesting the SP field Muslim women candidates freely. The exchange underscored deep partisan rifts on equity and secularism.

Supreme Court Spurns Plea Against Tetra Pack Liquor Sales in UP

New Delhi, 16/4(H.S.):The Supreme Court refused to hear a petition challenging alcohol sales in tetra packs in Uttar Pradesh. A bench headed by Chief Justice Suryakant directed petitioner Meenakshi Tiwari to submit her representation to relevant authorities. The CJI remarked that those wishing to buy liquor could do so in any form, questioning court intervention. While noting

no explicit excise policy authorization for tetra packs, the bench acknowledged a February 4, 2025, administrative order permitting small packs, now on record. Counsel argued the packaging endangers children and students, who could easily conceal them in schools or colleges. The court upheld deference to state policy on such matters.

Parliament Gears Up for Women's Quota Revolution and Bold Seat Redraw

New Delhi, 16 /4(H.S.):The Indian government will table three pivotal bills in a special parliamentary session today, paving the way for transformative electoral reforms. These measures aim to activate women's reservation ahead of the 2029 Lok Sabha elections and redraw constituency boundaries after decades of stasis, signaling a bold step toward gender parity and equitable representation. The trio of legislation includes the Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill, 2026; the Delimitation Bill, 2026; and the Union Territories Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026. At their core lies the Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill, a cornerstone proposal designed to enforce 33% reservation for women in the Lok Sabha and state legislative assemblies by kickstarting the delimitation process.

India and Austria Champion Lasting Peace in West Asia: PM Modi

New Delhi, 16 /4 (H.S.):Prime Minister Narendra Modi emphasized Thursday that amid global tensions impacting all nations, military conflict cannot resolve crises—only dialogue and peace can. Speaking at a joint press conference with Austrian Chancellor Christian Stocker at Hyderabad House, he affirmed India and Austria's shared commitment to enduring stability in Ukraine and West Asia. PM Modi called for reforming global institutions to tackle rising challenges and reiterated both nations' resolve to eradicate terrorism. He hailed Stocker's visit—first by an Austrian Chancellor in four decades—as historic, building on the 2026 India-EU Free Trade Agreement's fresh chapter. Boosting Trade, Innovation, and Mobility The trip will accelerate trade and investment, blending India's



"speed and scale" with Austria's "expertise" for reliable global tech and supply chains. Collaboration deepens in defense, semiconductors, quantum technology, and biotechnology; a new IIT Delhi-Montana University pact marks progress. PM Modi announced enhanced nursing sector mobility

under the 2023 Migration and Mobility Agreement, alongside startup-research ties and an India-Austria Working Holiday Programme. Austrian tunneling prowess shone in Delhi Metro and Atal Tunnel; firms now drive green energy and urban development. This landmark visit propels bilateral ties into a dynamic new era.

Harivansh Narayan Singh Set for Unopposed Rajya Sabha Deputy Chairmanship



New Delhi, 16 /4(H.S.):Harivansh Narayan Singh, nominated by the President, filed his nomination Thursday for Rajya Sabha Deputy Chairman at the secretariat, positioning him for a third term following two prior elections as JD(U) MP. Election occurs Friday, with opposition opting out over procedural grievances, ensuring his uncontested return. Opposition Boycotts, Cites Key Grievances Congress leader Jairam Ramesh announced the boycott on X,

clarifying no intent to disrespect Harivansh while hoping for greater accommodation in his new tenure. He listed three objections: Lok Sabha's vacant Deputy Speaker post for seven years; unprecedented nomination of a presidential appointee; lack of opposition consultation. Last month, President nominated Harivansh post his April 9 tenure expiry, leaving the role vacant since. As Vice President's ex-officio Chairman absence, the Deputy steers proceedings.

New Delhi, 16 /4 (H.S.):The government tabled three pivotal bills linked to women's reservation in the Lok Sabha on Thursday, the opening day of Parliament's extended budget session's three-day special sitting. Debate commenced post-formalities, with voting slated for Friday at 4 p.m.; Home Minister Amit Shah will respond. Bills Introduced Amid Procedural Votes At 11 a.m., Minister of Law and Justice (Independent Charge)



Arjun Ram Meghwal proposed the Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill-2026 and Delimitation Bill-2026. Shah moved the Union Territories Laws (Amendment) Bill-2026. The motions passed 251-185, meeting the simple majority threshold for constitutional amendments. The Speaker allocated 12 hours for combined discussion, extendable per opposition demands. Rajya Sabha follows April 18 with

10 hours allotted. Partisan Clashes Erupt Congress MP K.C. Venugopal opposed all three; Shah retorted he could raise only technical objections, not merits, vowing firm rebuttals in debate. Samajwadi Party's Dharmendra Yadav affirmed opposition to the package but backed women's quota unwaveringly as their staunchest proponents. The bills aim to secure 33% women's reservation in Lok Sabha and state assemblies post-delimitation.

Turkish School Massacre: Death Toll Climbs to Nine in Second Attack Within Days

Ankara, 16 /4 (H.S.): Tragedy deepened in southern Turkey as five more victims from Wednesday's middle school shooting succumbed to their injuries, raising the total fatalities to nine. Interior Minister Mustafa Ciftci confirmed the grim update, noting six survivors remain in intensive care, three critically. The assault unfolded at Aysel Calik Middle School in Kahramanmaraş's Onikisubat district, where a 13-year-old eighth-grader, armed with guns allegedly from his police officer father, stormed two classrooms and fired indiscriminately. Governor Mukerrem Unluer reported the attacker also perished at the scene, having used five firearms and seven magazines. Among the dead are one teacher and eight students, with 13 others wounded; initial chaos claimed four lives on-site. Authorities detained the suspect's father as investigations probe access to the weapons.



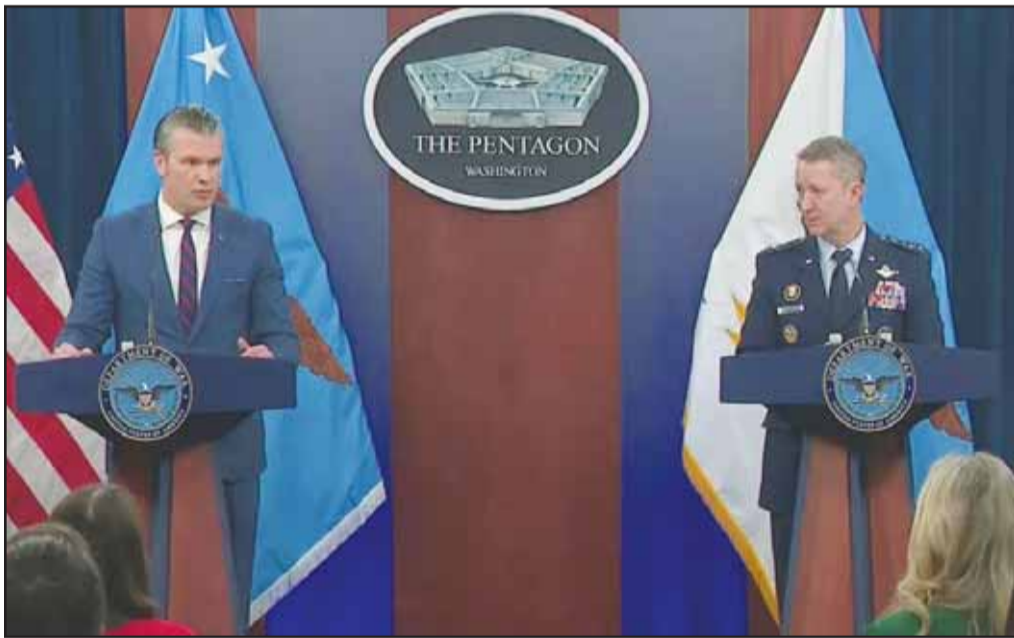
This horror follows Tuesday's attack in Sanliurfa's Siverek district, where an 18-year-old ex-student wounded 16 at Ahmet Koyuncu Vocational High School before suicide. Such school shootings, once exceedingly rare

in Turkey, now spark urgent scrutiny—last May, an Istanbul student fatally shot a principal months after expulsion. President Recep Tayyip Erdogan pledged parliamentary action, promising repercussions for negligence and

detailing post-Siverek measures: one suspect arrested, four officers suspended, and the school shuttered for four days. The back-to-back incidents have shattered Turkey's sense of security in educational havens.

U.S. Signals Next Moves in Iran Conflict as Hegseth-Ken Briefing Looms

Washington/Islamabad/Tehran, 16/4 (H.S.): The United States is poised to unveil its forthcoming strategy on the Iran war today, potentially startling the global community with bold declarations during a critical Pentagon press conference. Scheduled for 8:00 a.m. Eastern Time—5:30 p.m. Indian Standard Time—Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth and Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman General Dan Caine will address the two-week ceasefire amid escalating tensions. Pakistan has launched discussions for a second round of peace talks between Tehran and Washington, dispatching Army Chief Field Marshal Asim Munir to Tehran on Wednesday for high-level consultations with Iranian officials. White House spokesperson expressed optimism about ongoing dialogue, hinting that the next session could reconvene in Islamabad. Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, during an extended meeting with Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman in Riyadh, briefed him on



Pakistan's de-escalation initiatives and secured assurances of Islamabad's full backing. Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar accompanied Sharif, underscoring the military-civilian coordination in these diplomatic maneuvers. President Donald Trump radiated optimism, stating the conflict is

"very close to ending" and signaling potential direct peace negotiations with Iran alongside Pakistani Premier Sharif. This comes as Iran challenges U.S. claims of fully blockading its economic sea routes, threatening retaliation by disrupting another vital Middle Eastern waterway if

the naval chokehold persists. Reports from CBS News and Al Jazeera confirm the Pentagon's X announcement of the briefing, framing it as a pivotal moment in the fragile truce. As global stakeholders watch closely, these developments could reshape Middle East dynamics.

UN Approves \$12 Million Lifeline for War-Torn Iran Amid Escalating Crisis

New York/Tehran, 16.4 (H.S.): The United Nations has announced the release of \$12 million (approximately ₹100 crore) in emergency humanitarian aid for Iran, ravaged by conflict. This assistance comes in response to the deteriorating conditions in the country and the pressing needs of its civilians. UN relief chief Tom Fletcher stated that the 40-day conflict has resulted in the deaths of thousands of civilians, alongside severe damage to critical infrastructure. Essential services such as healthcare, water supply, and electricity have been profoundly disrupted. He emphasized that the funding will bolster relief efforts at the grassroots level through various partner organizations. Priority will be given to delivering food, medical aid, clean water, and other vital services to those affected. According to the United Nations, a large number of people have been displaced amid the current situation, requiring immediate support. This financial aid could prove lifesaving in these circumstances. Humanitarian agencies warn that the ongoing conflict is complicating conditions relentlessly, and without a swift, lasting resolution, the crisis risks deepening further.

US Escalates Economic Siege on Iran's Oil Lifeline Amid Strait of Hormuz Standoff



Washington, 16/4 (H.S.): In a bold escalation of its financial warfare, the United States unveiled sweeping new sanctions targeting Iran's oil sector on Wednesday, aiming to choke Tehran's revenue streams as the Islamic Republic maintains its stranglehold on the Strait of Hormuz. The measures, announced by the Treasury Department, strike at the heart of a shadowy petroleum shipping network led by Mohammad Hossein Shamkhani, imposing penalties on over two dozen individuals, companies, and vessels that facilitate Iran's illicit oil trade. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent framed the action as part of an "Economic Fury" campaign, zeroing in on regime insiders like the

Shamkhani family, who stand accused of profiting amid the suffering of ordinary Iranians. "These elites exploit their positions to sustain the regime's aggression," Bessent declared in a statement, referencing the network's operations across Iran and the United Arab Emirates. The sanctions dismantle a web of front companies masquerading as legitimate consulting and shipping firms, which have long evaded prior restrictions to keep Iran's oil flowing. This move compounds mounting pressures on Iran, which shuttered the Strait of Hormuz—the world's most vital oil chokepoint—in retaliation for the US-Israeli military campaign that ignited the broader Middle East conflict. The closure has

sent global energy prices soaring, prompting the US to impose a naval blockade on Iranian ports and refuse extensions on waivers for oil already in transit. State Department officials underscored the strategy's intent: "We are decisively curtailing Iran's capacity to fund its hostage-taking of the Strait." The Shamkhani network's targeting carries personal sting. Mohammad Hossein, son of the late security chief Ali Shamkhani—an advisor to Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei, killed on February 28 alongside his father in the war's opening salvos—orchestrated a fleet that dodged sanctions through deceptive practices. In a parallel strike, the Treasury also sanctioned Iranian financier Seyed Naimeaei Badroddin Moosavi and three linked firms for laundering oil proceeds into Venezuelan gold, bolstering Iran-backed Hezbollah militants. As tensions simmer, these sanctions signal Washington's resolve to outlast Iran's gambit without direct confrontation. Yet, with reports of potential ceasefire extensions and backchannel peace talks swirling, the economic vise could either hasten negotiations or harden Tehran's defiance. Global markets watch anxiously, as the Hormuz impasse threatens to ripple into widespread energy shortages and inflation.

Nepal Court Mandates Probe Directives in Oli-Lekhak Murder Case

Kathmandu, 16 /4 (H.S.): Kathmandu District Court has issued a four-point directive to police investigating murder charges against former Prime Minister K.P. Sharma Oli and ex-Home Minister Ramesh Lekhak, ensuring the probe persists despite their release on appearance bail. Per the District Government Attorney's Office, the Supreme Court's order freed Oli and Lekhak on bail over the past week, conditional on their availability for police summons and cooperation. To prevent any halt in proceedings post-release, prosecutors outlined specific investigative mandates. SP Pawan Kumar Bhattacharya of Kathmandu Police Range confirmed initial statements: Lekhak's at the



prosecutor's office, Oli's at the hospital where he remains admitted for health issues since arrest day. Key Investigative Directives Authorities must annex post-mortem reports for all deaths during the September 8, 2025, Gen Z movement clashes. Eyewitnesses to that day's

events require identification and statement recording. CCTV footage from the incident site must serve as evidence, with provisions for supplementary statements from the accused if new facts emerge. These steps uphold rigorous scrutiny amid Nepal's high-profile political scrutiny.

Nepal Gears Up for Legislative Overhaul: Over 100 New Laws on Horizon



Kathmandu, 16 /4 (H.S.): The Government of Nepal is poised to enact more than 100 new laws while amending existing legislation, with subject identification now complete across key sectors. Government spokesperson and Education Minister Sasmit Pokhrel revealed that 103 topics for fresh

legislation and targeted amendments have been finalized. All 22 ministries, in coordination with the Prime Minister's and Cabinet offices, are prioritizing these initiatives to expedite drafting and implementation. The Ministry of Law, Justice, and Parliamentary Affairs is rigorously reviewing compliance

with legislative frameworks and processes, while issuing directives to other ministries on a priority basis. From this comprehensive list, the government aims to steer 40 to 45 bills through the upcoming federal parliament session, signaling a bold push for systemic reforms.

Clashes Rage in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa as Pakistan Police Overrun Terrorist Hideouts



Islamabad, 16 /4 (H.S.): Security forces in Pakistan's Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province are locked in an intense gunbattle with militants, leaving two terrorists dead and at least one police officer martyred, while several others have been wounded. The operation, launched late at night in the Baghoto Top Serki and Chambar Gul areas, marks the latest chapter in Pakistan's ongoing counterterrorism campaign in its volatile northwestern belt. According to local police reports, security teams cordoned off the two mountainous zones late Wednesday and launched a major raid against a group of suspected terrorists. A senior police officer in Kohat confirmed that the operation

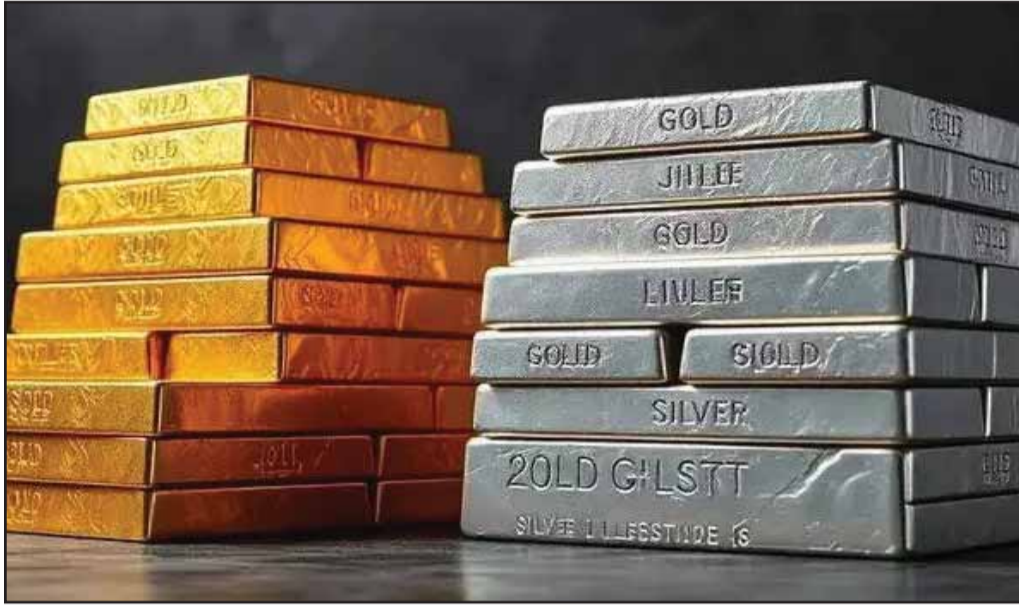
has been underway for several hours and will continue until every trapped militant is neutralized. "The operation is now in a decisive phase," the Kohat Superintendent of Police told reporters, underscoring that no terrorist would be allowed to escape the encircled area. Officials say two militants were killed in the initial exchange of fire, while at least one police officer lost his life in the operation. Several other police personnel sustained injuries but are reported to be stable. The high-alert security environment in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has prompted authorities to intensify search and clearance operations across the region, as part of a broader drive to disrupt militant networks and prevent further attacks on civilian and security targets.

Pakistan-Mediated Path to Peace: US Signals Optimism on Iran Deal as Tehran Tests US Blockade

Islamabad / Tehran / Washington, 16/4 (H.S.): The United States has described itself as "optimistic" about striking a second-phase peace deal with Iran, even as Tehran escalates its rhetorical defiance of a US-led naval blockade and threatens to shut down vital Red Sea and Gulf trade routes. The diplomatic momentum is now being funneled through Pakistan, whose senior delegation arrived in Tehran on Wednesday carrying a fresh message from Washington ahead of a potential new round of talks in Islamabad. Pakistan's army chief, General Asim Munir, led the delegation to Tehran at the invitation of both Washington and Iran, underscoring Islamabad's role as a neutral intermediary in the six-week war between the US-led coalition and Iran. Pakistani officials say their modest but crucial goal is not to announce an immediate breakthrough, but simply to "keep the talks going" and prevent a slide back into full-scale hostilities. In Tehran, Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi welcomed the Pakistani delegation, underscoring the importance of multi-track diplomacy and the fact that "several messages" have already been exchanged via Islamabad since the inconclusive first-round negotiations in Islamabad ended last Sunday. White House press secretary Karoline Leavitt told reporters that a second round of negotiations "would very likely" be held again in Pakistan's capital, though the exact dates and format are still being negotiated.

Gold Shines Brighter, Silver Gleams: Domestic Bull Run Ignites Jewellery Markets

New Delhi, 16/4 (H.S.): India's domestic bullion markets opened with robust gains on Thursday, as gold prices surged by ₹1,300 to ₹1,42,410 per 10 grams in early trading. Silver followed suit, climbing ₹11,800 per kilogram, reflecting heightened investor sentiment amid global cues. Internationally, spot gold advanced 0.63% to \$4,820.45 per ounce, while silver traded at \$78.61 per ounce, bolstering the domestic rally. This uptick propelled 24-carat gold to trade between ₹1,55,360 and ₹1,56,230 per 10 grams across major markets, with 22-carat gold ranging from ₹1,42,410 to ₹1,43,300 per 10 grams. Silver, meanwhile, reached ₹2,70,100 per kilogram in Delhi's bullion hub. City-wise, Delhi saw 24-carat gold at ₹1,55,510 and 22-carat at ₹1,42,560 per 10 grams. Mumbai quoted 24-carat at ₹1,55,360 and 22-carat at ₹1,42,410; Ahmedabad



at ₹1,55,410 and ₹1,42,460 respectively. Chennai led with 24-carat at ₹1,56,230 and 22-carat at ₹1,43,300, while Kolkata and Bengaluru mirrored Mumbai's levels at ₹1,55,360 and ₹1,42,410. Bhopal

and Patna both recorded 24-carat at ₹1,55,410 and 22-carat at ₹1,42,460; Lucknow and Jaipur hit ₹1,55,510 and ₹1,42,560. Strength persisted in southern and eastern states, with Bengaluru, Hyderabad, and

Bhubaneswar aligning at ₹1,55,360 for 24-carat and ₹1,42,410 for 22-carat gold. These gains signal sustained momentum in regional markets, driven by festive demand and global factors.

Profit-Taking Jolts Early Trade, Yet Sensex and Nifty Hold Green Amid Selling Pressure

New Delhi, 16/4 (H.S.): Bolstered by strong global cues, India's equity benchmarks displayed resilience in early trading on Thursday, opening higher before profit-taking triggered dips. Despite bouts of selling, both the Sensex and Nifty remained in positive territory, with the BSE Sensex up 0.19% and the NSE Nifty up 0.21% as of 10 AM. Blue-chip performers included Hindalco Industries, JSW Steel, Tata Steel, Infosys, and Larsen & Toubro, which gained between 1.37% and 2.73%. In contrast, Sun Pharma, Tata Consumer Products, Apollo Hospitals, Coal India, and Nestle declined 0.50% to 0.86%. Among active stocks, 2,746 saw trading volume, with 1,866 advancing and 880 declining; Sensex's 30 constituents had 20 gainers versus 10 decliners, while Nifty's 50 stocks showed 32 green and 18 red. The BSE



Sensex opened 566.32 points higher at 78,677.56, peaking at 78,730.32 before sliding to 78,241.63 on sustained selling. It stabilized at 78,255.73, up 144.49 points by 10 AM. Similarly, the NSE Nifty debuted 153.90 points up at 24,385.20, touched 24,400.95, then dipped to 24,275.20 amid

profit-taking, closing the first half-hour firmly green at 24,281.80, up 50.50 points. This followed Wednesday's robust close, where Sensex surged 1,263.67 points (1.64%) to 78,111.24 and Nifty rose 388.65 points (1.63%) to 24,231.30, setting a bullish tone for today's session.

Iran Tensions Cloud US Gas Price Outlook

Washington: The Trump administration has linked the outlook for US fuel prices to developments in the Iran conflict, saying a sustained drop in gasoline costs will depend on the reopening of the Strait of Hormuz and progress in ongoing negotiations. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent told reporters at a White House news conference on Wednesday (local time) that the timing of lower gas prices remained uncertain, citing disruptions in global oil flows linked to tensions involving Iran. "I'm optimistic that sometime between June 20th and September 20th, we can have \$3 gas again," Bessent said, while noting that outcomes would depend on how negotiations

evolve. He said the Strait of Hormuz had not been "completely reopened," adding that energy markets would stabilise once shipping lanes return to normal operations. Bessent said discussions with Middle Eastern finance ministers indicated that oil production could resume quickly once conditions improve. "Once the Straits are open, they can start pumping again within one week," he said. The administration said it was closely monitoring fuel pricing behaviour, urging retailers to pass on reductions as crude prices ease. White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt said current price pressures reflected a broader strategic effort tied to the Iran situation. "This is a short-term

disruption for the long-term strategic goal of the United States," she said, referring to efforts to prevent Iran from obtaining a nuclear weapon. Leavitt said the administration expected fuel prices to decline once operations conclude and the Strait reopens, pointing to the government's focus on domestic energy production. Bessent described the approach as "short-term volatility for long-term gain," suggesting that temporary economic strain was part of a wider strategy. The administration also highlighted efforts to stabilise global energy flows, including coordination with allies and regional partners.

Global Optimism Ignites Asian Rally: Peace Hopes Fuel Bullish Surge Across Markets

New Delhi, 16/4 (H.S.): Global markets radiated positive signals on Thursday, buoyed by rising hopes of a West Asia peace accord, with U.S. President Donald Trump signaling that the Iran conflict is nearing resolution. Wall Street closed robustly higher in the prior session, propelling Dow Jones futures up 0.10% to 48,514.27, while European indices delivered mixed results: FTSE down 0.47% at 10,559.58, CAC weaker by 0.64% at 8,274.57, and DAX marginally up 0.09% at 24,066.70. Asia embraced widespread buying fervor, with all nine major indices



trading green. Gift Nifty climbed 0.59% (143 points) to 24,392.50; Taiwan Weighted rose 0.68% (251.39 points) to 36,973.53. Japan's Nikkei soared 2.27% (1,320.76 points) to 59,455. Korea's Kospi gained 1.90% (115.82 points) to 6,207.21, and Hong Kong's Hang Seng advanced 1.60% (414.68 points) to 26,362. Gains extended to Shanghai Composite (+0.53%) at 4,048.64, Jakarta Composite (+0.18% at 7,637.07), SET Composite (+0.06% at 1,507.67), and Straits Times (+0.04% at 5,023.22), underscoring broad-based momentum amid de-escalation optimism in U.S.-Iran talks.

10-Year Yield May Dip Below 7 Pct As GDP Seen At 7.1 Pct: Report

New Delhi, 16/4 (H.S.): India's benchmark 10-year government bond yield could ease below the 7 per cent mark by June, even as near-term volatility persists due to global and domestic factors, a report said on Thursday. As per the analysis of Crisil Intelligence, bond yields witnessed significant volatility in March, driven by a sharp rise in crude oil prices and heightened geopolitical tensions, which pushed the benchmark yield to its highs for the current financial year. However, easing inflationary pressures, supportive liquidity conditions, and policy expectations are likely to help stabilise yields in the coming months, it said. The report added that, in its base case, India's gross domestic product (GDP) growth is expected at 7.1 per cent in the current fiscal, supported by healthy private consumption and steady investment growth. Export growth is also expected to benefit from lower US tariffs, although



disruptions to global trade due to the West Asia conflict and slower global growth may act as a drag. It further noted that government measures to cap retail fuel prices could support consumption. On

inflation, Crisil projected CPI inflation to average 4.5 per cent in fiscal 2027. It said domestic liquidity remains comfortable, which is expected to act as a cushion against external shocks,

even as global uncertainties continue to weigh on sentiment. The report also highlighted that crude oil prices and geopolitical developments, particularly in West Asia, remain

key risk factors for the bond market. Elevated oil prices could stoke inflation concerns and limit the pace of any decline in yields, it said. At the same time, global cues, including movements in US Treasury yields and the US Federal Reserve's policy trajectory, are expected to play a crucial role in shaping the direction of Indian bond yields. On the domestic front, the Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) liquidity management measures and policy stance will be closely watched, with the central bank expected to play a stabilising role amid volatile conditions. Crisil added that its base case assumes the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) will maintain policy rates during the current fiscal. Despite these headwinds, Crisil maintained that the outlook remains moderately positive, with yields expected to gradually soften as macroeconomic conditions improve and volatility subsides.

Wipro Q4 Profit Slips 1.9 Pct To Rs 3,501.8 Crore; Announces Rs 15,000 Crore Buyback

Mumbai: Wipro, a leading global end-to-end IT transformation, consulting and business process services provider, on Thursday reported a 1.89 per cent year-on-year (YoY) decline in its consolidated profit after tax to Rs 3,501.8 crore for the fourth quarter of FY26, compared to Rs 3,569.6 crore in the same period previous financial year (Q4 FY25). On a sequential basis, however, the company posted a 12.27 per cent rise in profit, according to its stock exchange filing. Earnings per share stood at Rs 3.34 (₹0.041), up 12.1 per cent quarter-on-quarter but down 2.1 per cent year-on-year. Revenue from operations rose 7.69 per cent year-on-year to Rs 24,236.3 crore in the March quarter, as against Rs 22,504.2 crore a year ago. Sequentially, revenue increased 2.88 per cent, as per the exchange filing. Looking ahead, Wipro said it expects revenue from its IT Services segment to be in the range of \$2,597 million to \$2,651 million for the June 2026 quarter. This translates into a sequential growth guidance of -2.0 per cent to 0 per cent in constant currency terms. The company's board also approved a share buyback of up to 60 crore fully paid-up equity shares, representing 5.7 per cent of its total paid-up equity capital, for an aggregate amount not exceeding Rs 15,000 crore at a price of Rs 250 per share, subject to shareholder approval. Commenting on the performance, CEO and Managing Director Srinji Pallia said advancements in artificial intelligence are reshaping client priorities and opening up new opportunities for deeper partnerships. "To strengthen our position in an AI-first world, we are pivoting to a services-as-a-software model through the AI Native Business & Platforms unit," he added. Chief Financial Officer Aparna Iyer said the company has continued to invest in clients, capabilities and talent while maintaining margins within a narrow band. "During the year we have returned substantial portion of our cash generated to shareholders in the form of dividend," Iyer mentioned.

India's Technology Talent Key In Global Crypto Race

Washington, 16/4 (H.S.): India's deep pool of technology talent is emerging as a critical factor in the global race to build digital asset infrastructure, participants at a policy discussion have said. The discussion, held under Chatham House Rules on Wednesday (local time), highlighted India's growing importance in the crypto ecosystem, driven by its large base of software developers and expanding digital capabilities. Participants said the shift towards digital assets — including stablecoins, tokenised securities and blockchain-based finance — is increasing demand

for specialised engineering talent. India, they noted, is well-positioned to meet that demand. The country accounts for a significant share of global software development activity. Its experience in building and scaling digital systems was cited as a key advantage in the next phase of financial innovation. Noting that the open-source nature of blockchain technology lowers barriers for new entrants, the participants said this creates opportunities for Indian firms to compete globally without the legacy constraints seen in traditional financial



systems. Some participants pointed to the potential for Indian companies to emerge as major players in digital finance, including the rise of new fintech firms focused on crypto infrastructure and payments. At the same time, India's regulatory approach remains cautious. Concerns around monetary sovereignty, capital controls and financial stability continue to shape policy discussions, particularly on privately issued digital currencies. Participants said this caution reflects broader risks associated with cross-border digital assets, especially

for large and complex economies. India's digital public infrastructure — including real-time payments and identity systems — was cited as a strong foundation for future growth. Participants said these systems could support the integration of new technologies into financial services. There was also growing interest among global firms in India as both a talent hub and a long-term market. A large consumer base, rising digital adoption and strong technical expertise make the country strategically important, participants said.

The all-clear confirms his back stress injury—sidelining him to just one professional match since August last year—is now fully healed. Cummins heads back to India on Friday to rejoin Sunrisers Hyderabad for the remainder of the tournament, partnering compatriot Travis Head. Though SRH face Chennai Super Kings this weekend and Delhi Capitals next Wednesday at home, he plans a measured return, targeting the April 25 clash against Rajasthan Royals in Jaipur. His reintegration could restore his captaincy, vacated by Ishan Kishan during absence; SRH sits fourth with two victories. This aligns with Cummins' strategy to feature in the IPL's business end and playoffs, priming for



Australia's grueling Test slate—potentially 21 matches over 12 months starting August against Bangladesh. In a recent 'Business of Sport' podcast, Cummins reaffirmed commitment to all formats, prioritizing key Test and ODI series as captain while scheduling 2-3 month breaks for fitness. "I still want to play all three formats... Test cricket

means the world to me. Hopefully, I can keep going for the next 3-5 years without dropping it," he shared. Australia's Tests kick off with two in Bangladesh (Darwin, Mackay), followed by three in South Africa, four versus New Zealand at home, five in India (Jan-Feb 2027), the MCG's 150th anniversary Test in March,

a likely Lord's World Test Championship final in June, and five-Ashes clashes. SRH coach Daniel Vettori hailed Cummins' "outstanding" conditioning after prolonged layoff. "Preparing to bowl fully fit is a long, arduous process—he's excelled in strength and conditioning," Vettori noted, underscoring Cummins' resolve to honor his near-AS4 million IPL contract.

Bayern Munich Stuns Real Madrid in Thriller to Reach Champions League Semis

Munich, 16 /41 (H.S.): Bayern Munich overcame a resilient Real Madrid 4-3 in a pulsating UEFA Champions League quarter-final second leg on Wednesday night, clinching a 6-4 aggregate triumph and booking a semi-final clash with defending champions Paris Saint-Germain. Late strikes from Luis Díaz and Michael Olise sealed a memorable comeback after Real's early dominance. The match exploded into life as Arda Güler stunned Bayern with a 35th-second opener, capitalizing on Manuel Neuer's errant pass. Aleksandar Pavlovic leveled via



header in the 6th minute, but Güler's sublime 29th-minute free-kick restored Real's lead. Harry Kane equalized eight minutes later, only for Kylian Mbappé to nod home just before halftime, tying the aggregate at 4-4. Tempo slowed post-interval, with Neuer's heroics preserving parity. Real's hopes crumbled in the 86th minute when Eduardo Camavinga earned a second yellow; Díaz pounced in the 89th, and Olise struck in injury time for glory. Arda Güler later saw red for dissent, compounding Madrid's woes.
