India's design-linked incentive scheme showing good results: Ashwini Vaishnaw

New Delhi: India's design-linked incentive (DLI) scheme is showing good results, Union Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw has said, hailing the country's first flagship AI system on chip (SOC) 'A2000' at 12nm technology node designed by Thiruvananthapuram-based fabless semiconductor startup Netrasemi.

The chip has now achieves successful silicon Bringup and getting ready for commercial production.

"Netrasemi has designed India's first Edge AI System-on-Chip (SoC) 'NETRA A2000', at advanced 12 nm node. At commercial scale, this will power smart vision devices for surveillance, automotive, robotics, drones, etc," the minister posted on X.

The chip with smart vision and real-time video analytics capabilities enables on-device AI for smart cameras and Edge AI platforms.

The chip, fabricated at TSMC's 12nm advanced process node, targets high-TOPS AI performance, computer vision, Video streaming, secure boot and significant IO capabilities.

It features Netrasemi's in-house Neural processor (NPU), Vision cores (VPU), Image Signal Processor (ISP), Crypto-Engines and other hardware acceleration IP cores.

It also features their patented Heterogeneous graph-stream parallel



processing architecture.

The chip design will be shared with select OEMs for joint R&D to develop further commercial use cases. The chip commercial production is likely to begin next year at TSMC, Taiwan, according to the startup.

"Our SoCs goes beyond conventional AI/ML integration by combining proprietary hardware acceleration IPs with domain-specific optimisations tailored for high-performance, real-time edge AI," said Jyothis Indirabhai, Co-founder and CEO, Netrasemi.

"We are currently working with several leading OEMs to facilitate early sample evaluations, co-development, and advanced R&D initiatives," said Indirabhai.

The semiconductor design-linked incentive (DLI) and design infrastructure support (DIS) schemes have played a key role in achieving this critical milestone.

The company was one of the first four startups selected for Rs 15 crore DLI support in 2023 by MeitY. Netrasemi has raised Rs 125 crore in total funding to date.

Government of Odisha and ADB Advance Transformative Urban Mobility Agenda for BCPPER Region

H&UD dept Reviews Progress of ADB-Supported Regional Mobility Planning and Bus Service Transformation Initiatives

Bhubaneswar : In a significant step towards building a sustainable, integrated and future-ready mobility ecosystem, the Housing & Urban Development Department, Government of Odisha, today reviewed the progress of the Asian Development Bank (ADB)-supported Technical Assistance Programme for preparation of a Comprehensive Regional Mobility Plan (CRMP) for the Bhubaneswar-Cuttack-Puri-Paradip Economic Region (BCPPER) and a State-wide Bus Service Transformation Roadmap. The review meeting was chaired by Additional Chief Secretary, Housing & Urban Development Department, Smt. Usha Padhee. Senior officials of the Department, representatives of ADB, consultants from SYSTRA and Delhi Integrated Multi-Modal Transit System Ltd. (DIMTS), along with representatives of concerned agencies, participated in the discussions. The ADB Technical Assistance programme, signed in December 2025 with an assistance amount of US\$1 million, aims to lay the foundation for an integrated regional mobility framework linking public transport, land use planning, transit-oriented development, logistics, digital mobility solutions and institutional reforms across the emerging economic region. During the



review, consultant teams presented the roadmap for preparation of the Comprehensive Regional Mobility Plan covering nearly 11,900 sq. km of the BCPPER region. Home to an estimated population of over 9.2 million and a workforce exceeding 4.1 million, the region is emerging as Odisha's principal economic growth corridor and requires a coordinated mobility strategy to support future development. The proposed CRMP will provide a twenty-year vision for regional mobility and urban growth, encompassing multimodal transport systems, public transit networks, non-motorised transport infrastructure, freight and logistics management, parking policies, transit-oriented development and climate-resilient mobility solutions. The plan will be supported by detailed surveys, GIS-

based mapping, travel demand modelling and socio-economic assessments. The meeting also reviewed progress on the State-wide Bus Service Transformation Roadmap being prepared for Capital Region Urban Transport (CRUT) and Odisha State Road Transport Corporation (OSRTC). The roadmap seeks to strengthen public transport services through route rationalisation, schedule optimisation, fleet augmentation, electrification strategies, digital systems and enhanced financial sustainability. The proposed strategy envisages significant strengthening of CRUT's urban bus operations to meet growing mobility demand in the capital region while supporting OSRTC in developing a long-term operational and financial roadmap for improving regional and inter-city

connectivity across Odisha. The initiative will also promote the adoption of Intelligent Transport Systems (ITS), data-driven decision-making and improved passenger services. The review further discussed policy frameworks relating to Transit-Oriented Development (TOD), Land Value Capture (LVC), urban redevelopment and sustainable financing mechanisms to support future mobility investments. Deliberations were also held on operationalising a Unified Transport Authority (UTA) for the BCPPER region to facilitate integrated transport planning and multimodal coordination. ADB representatives briefed the meeting on the proposed City Economic Region (CER) initiative for BCPPER, which aims to integrate regional mobility, urban development, logistics, governance reforms

and digital infrastructure under a common development framework. Discussions focused on identifying priority projects and investment opportunities for future implementation and financing support. Chairing the meeting, Smt. Usha Padhee emphasized the need for an integrated regional approach to mobility planning and urban development. She underscored the importance of inter-departmental coordination, timely data sharing, evidence-based planning and stakeholder engagement for successful implementation of the programme. She observed that the Bhubaneswar-Cuttack-Puri-Paradip corridor has the potential to emerge as a model economic region driven by efficient mobility systems, sustainable urbanisation and enhanced connectivity. She directed all concerned agencies to extend full support to the planning process and ensure timely progress of all activities under the ADB Technical Assistance programme. The meeting concluded with a roadmap for the next phase of activities, including commencement of core planning exercises, policy consultations, institutional strengthening initiatives and periodic reviews to monitor progress and ensure alignment with Odisha's long-term urban development vision.

Rain lashes parts of Delhi-NCR; IMD issues red, orange alerts

New Delhi: Rain lashed parts of Delhi-NCR on Saturday evening, followed by dust storms and strong winds, bringing relief from the heat as the India Meteorological Department (IMD) issued red and orange alerts warning of thunderstorms, lightning, hail and further rainfall across the national capital.



north Delhi, along with Shahdara and New Delhi districts, are also expected to receive light to moderate rain accompanied by thunderstorms and lightning.

In these areas, winds are likely to blow at speeds of 40 to 60 kmph, with gusts of up to 80 kmph. The weather department also forecast light rainfall in parts of south Delhi. Residents have been advised to stay indoors during the weather activity, avoid sheltering under trees, keep away from weak structures and disconnect electrical appliances during

thunderstorms. The IMD said the sudden change in weather is linked to an active western disturbance over north-west India and an associated cyclonic circulation, which have increased moisture and instability across the region. The change comes after several days of hot weather in Delhi and is expected to provide temporary relief from the heat. Earlier on Saturday, the city recorded a minimum temperature of 24.6 degrees Celsius, which was two degrees below normal. The maximum temperature is expected to remain around 36 degrees Celsius.

BJP state president Mahendra Bhatt said the discussions focused on

strengthening the party organisation and electoral strategy.

"A list of 100 intellectuals from each Assembly constituency will be prepared, and contact will be established with them. Coordination between the government and organisation must be strengthened, and MLAs should help in strengthening booths where teams are incomplete," he added.

Bhatt further said, "For seats where the BJP could not win, MPs and MLAs will be given additional responsibility, and full-time workers will also be deployed. There was no discussion on any MLA survey. For seats won with narrow margins, efforts will be made to increase victory margins."

Mourning Over the Untimely Demise of Netaji Admirer Pabitra Mishra



Paradip (DMC):- Deep sorrow has gripped the region following the untimely demise of Pabitra Mohan Mishra (65), a retired employee of Paradip Port, a devoted admirer of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Working President of the Bharatiya Bandar Mazdoor Sangh, and founder of the Netaji Memorial Club. Mr. Mishra passed away due to a cardiac arrest at around 9 PM on Thursday night at his residence in Garee Sasan village under Kujang Block of Jagatsinghpur district.

It is noteworthy that late Mishra was an ardent devotee of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, and through his efforts, a statue of Netaji had been installed at the Badapadia Bus Stand Square in Paradip.

In a major crackdown on financial irregularities within cooperative banking institutions, today, Odisha Vigilance has arrested a cooperative official for the misappropriation of government funds of Rs.33,80,963/-. The accused, identified as Sri Patitapaban Majhi, is the former Secretary of the Garhsantri Service Co-

operative Society (SCS) under the Angul United Central Co-operative Bank (AUCCB) Ltd., Banarpal Branch. He is presently working as a banking assistant at the Angul United Central Co-operative Bank Ltd. headquarters in Angul. "Based on the alleged embezzlement of Govt funds over Rs.33 Lakhs, an investigation was taken up by Odisha Vigilance. The

thorough investigation revealed that the financial crime dates back to the financial year 2017-18. "During his tenure as the Executive Secretary of the Garhsantri SCS, Sri Majhi was entrusted with managing daily financial collections and government deposits. Sri Majhi allegedly made a series of fraudulent and fabricated entries in the primary account logs

(Day Books) of the Garhsantri Service Co-operative Society and diverted the funds. While the books showed the transactions as balanced or accounted for, the corresponding physical cash totalling to Rs. 33,80,963/- was never deposited into the Angul United Central Co-operative Bank. The diverted funds, meant for agricultural and cooperative development schemes, were

instead pocketed and diverted for personal use. "In this connection, Cuttack Vigilance PS Case No 21 dated 29.05.2026 under Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 & different sections of IPC has been registered against the accused Sri Majhi. He is being forwarded today to the Honourable Court of Special Judge, Vigilance, Angul. "Detailed report follows.

Odisha Begins Intensive Voter List Revision Drive From Tomorrow

Puri: Odisha will launch the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls across the state from Saturday, with Booth Level Officers (BLOs) set to conduct door-to-door visits till June 28, Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) R.S. Gopalan said on Friday.

Speaking after inaugurating a sand art awareness campaign on Puri's Niladri Beach, Gopalan urged citizens to cooperate in what he described as a "national exercise" aimed at ensuring error-free voter lists.

The CEO said BLOs would distribute two forms to every voter during the house visits. Voters are required to retain one copy and submit the other to the concerned BLO after verification. He added that BLOs would assist voters in correcting errors related to names, parents' names, date of birth, address and photographs in the electoral rolls.



Keeping in view the prevailing heatwave conditions, BLOs will conduct field visits during morning hours and remain available at their respective booths every day from 3 pm to 5 pm, he said.

Gopalan informed that nearly 95% mapping work in the state has already been

completed, terming it a "major achievement", and thanked BLOs for their efforts.

Puri collector Divya Jyoti Parida said all arrangements for the SIR exercise in the district had been completed and BLOs as well as supervisors had undergone training.

Voters can also download forms from the Election Commission's official website — voters.eci.gov.in? — fill them up and upload them online. BLOs will provide assistance to those facing difficulties in completing the process, officials said.

The CEO further stated

that non-Indian citizens would be removed directly from the electoral rolls.

Among those present at the programme were additional CEO Sushant Kumar Mishra, additional district magistrates Sarat Chandra Behera, Dr Sarat Chandra Mohapatra and Nilamadhab Bhoi, deputy

CEO Laxmiprasad Sahu, Anamika Singh, finance adviser and additional secretary Sanjay Lugun, sub-collector Raj Kishore Jena, deputy secretary Shashwata Pradhan, additional sub-collector Nilamadhab Majhi and election deputy collector Runita Pradhan.

Officials also outlined the timeline for the revision exercise. July 1 has been fixed as the qualifying date for the revision. Door-to-door verification by BLOs will continue from May 30 to June 28, while rationalisation of polling booths is scheduled to be completed by June 28.

The draft electoral roll will be published on July 5, followed by the claims and objections period from July 5 to August 4. Disposal of claims and objections will continue till September 2, and the final electoral roll will be published on September 6, officials said.

Paradip Trailer & Transporters Joint Coordination Committee meeting held

Paradip (DMC) -: A significant meeting was held on Friday at Hotel Golden Anchor involving the Joint Coordination Committee (JCC), formed by three trailer associations of Paradip — Paradip Trailer and Gas Tanker Owners' Association, Paradip Trailer Owners' Association, and Prakruti Container Trust along with representatives of 17 transporter organizations.

The meeting was chaired by JCC Chairman and renowned trade union leader Prakash Tripathy. Trailer owners and representatives of 17 transport companies participated in the discussion.

As container-based cargo handling has increased in Paradip, the number of trailers operating in the region has also risen considerably. Various issues arising out of this situation were discussed



during the meeting. While transporting container cargo for Paradip Port, trailer operators are facing problems regarding vehicle parking in the port area. The Estate Department of Paradip Port is reportedly charging a parking fee of ₹10,000 per vehicle, which

drew strong dissatisfaction and concern during the meeting. JCC Chairman Mr. Tripathy stated that the matter would soon be brought to the attention of the port administration to seek an early resolution.

At present, trailer owners are already finding it

difficult to pay vehicle installments and drivers' salaries. In such circumstances, the additional burden of paying ₹10,000 as parking fees has become extremely challenging for them. Besides, several other issues were also discussed during the meeting, and efforts were made to resolve them. Rengali's Soul Fades Under the Shadow of Industry

The Light of Development Must Not Remain Confined Within Industrial Walls.

Industrialisation is undoubtedly essential for a nation's economic growth. Industries and mining activities strengthen the economy, generate revenue, and create employment opportunities. However, an important question remains: Development for whom? If development comes at the cost of the environment, public health, culture, and traditional lifestyles of local communities, can it truly be called inclusive development?

The Cry of Rengali's Soul.

The Rengali region of Sambalpur district has emerged as a prominent

industrial and mining hub over the years. Amid grand promises of development, revenue generation, and industrial expansion, the villages, natural environment, and social fabric of the region appear to be facing a silent crisis. Looking at present-day Rengali, one cannot help but feel that somewhere along the path of progress, the bond between people and their land has been left behind.

There was a time when village ponds were not merely water sources; they were the heart of community life. Bathing at the pond

ghats, evening gatherings, festivals, and strong bonds of brotherhood gave rural life its unique charm. Temples, Bhagabata Tungis, and devotional songs filled the atmosphere with spirituality and cultural richness. Today, those familiar sounds have largely faded. The sweet echoes of traditional hymns seem to have been drowned out by the roar of machinery and the noise of industrial activity.

Development is necessary, but it must not come at the expense of the very people it is meant to benefit. The challenge lies in balancing economic growth with environmental sustainability and cultural preservation.

Governments continue to announce large-scale drinking water projects worth crores of rupees. While these schemes



often appear impressive on paper, the reality on the ground is frequently different. Many villages still struggle with drinking water shortages, inadequate water

conservation measures, and neglected local water bodies. Ponds that once served as lifelines for rural communities have fallen into disrepair. Their restoration could

significantly ease water-related problems and strengthen local water security. The burden of this transformation is often borne by lower and middle-income

families. Many people who lost land for industrial projects continue to face uncertainty regarding sustainable livelihoods. While employment opportunities were promised, the benefits have not reached everyone equally. As industrial chimneys rise higher into the sky, the hopes of many local residents seem to be fading.

This is a crucial moment for policymakers and administrators. Development cannot be measured solely in terms of industries, investments, and revenue. Equal importance must be given to people, the environment, and cultural heritage. Restoration of village ponds, environmental protection, proper rehabilitation of displaced

families, and preservation of rural traditions require urgent attention.

The people of Rengali are not opposed to development. Their aspiration is simple: the benefits of progress should reach their homes and communities, rather than remaining confined within the walls of industrial establishments. True development will be achieved only when village ponds sparkle alongside industrial growth, temple bells continue to ring amidst progress, and ordinary people can live with dignity on their ancestral land. Only then can the development of Rengali be considered meaningful and complete

Armed Dacoity Gang Busted: All Five Accused Apprehended Following Exchange of Fire and Intensive Combing Operation

Jharsuguda : Jharsuguda Police has successfully busted an armed criminal gang allegedly involved in preparations for committing dacoity and apprehended all five accused persons following a coordinated operation under Rengali Police Station.

On the night of 29.05.2026, Jharsuguda Police received credible intelligence that a group of armed criminals had entered the Rengali area and were allegedly planning to commit a dacoity targeting a financial institution. Acting on the intelligence, a special police team was constituted and strategic

surveillance and interception measures were undertaken.

During the operation, a suspicious pickup vehicle was traced near Maa Ghanteswari Temple, Kadamghat. When signalled to stop, the occupants attempted to flee. Police pursued the vehicle and resorted to controlled firing at the rear portion of the vehicle to safely intercept it.

Subsequently, one of the accused allegedly opened fire at the police party. Despite being repeatedly asked to surrender, he continued firing, compelling police personnel to return fire in

exercise of their right of private defence. During the exchange of fire, accused Jay Chouhan (30), of Brajrajnagar, sustained a gunshot injury to his right thigh and was apprehended. He was immediately provided medical assistance and shifted for treatment.

Following the incident, the remaining accused fled towards the adjoining forest area taking advantage of darkness. A massive search and combing operation was launched by Jharsuguda Police. Through sustained efforts and intensive area domination, all four absconding accused were subsequently apprehended. The arrested accused are:

1. Jay Chouhan (30), Brajrajnagar
2. Karan Chouhan (28), Brajrajnagar
3. Biswajit Nayak (27), Brajrajnagar
4. Santosh Mahato @ Bade (28), Brajrajnagar
5. Rohit Kumar Singh @ Rabi @ Barud (30), Brajrajnagar

Preliminary investigation reveals that several of the accused are habitual offenders with criminal antecedents involving offences such as attempt to murder, robbery, preparation for dacoity, theft, criminal intimidation and Arms Act violations. Seizure : During the operation, police recovered and seized:

- One country-made pistol
- Two empty cartridges
- One Bhujali (sharp-edged weapon)
- One imitation firearm
- One pickup vehicle used by the accused persons

Scientific examination of the seized articles and further investigation are underway. A case has been registered under relevant provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita and Arms Act. Efforts are continuing to ascertain the gang's wider criminal activities and possible involvement in other offences. Jharsuguda Police remains committed to taking firm action against organized crime and ensuring the safety and security of the public



Press Conference on SIR held in Nuapada

NUAPADA/KHARIAR ROAD, May 30 (T.Dewangan) : A press conference regarding the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of the voter list was held in Nuapada under the Chairmanship of District Election officer & Collector Madhusudan Dash on Saturday.

During the meeting, the collector gave a detailed presentation on the SIR schedule, distribution and collection of enumeration forms, duties of BLOs and BLO supervisors, form filing procedures, objection filing and disposal, training of BLOs and help desk arrangements. The collector stated that the main objective of the SIR process is to make the voter list accurate, error free and transparent by including eligible voters and removing ineligible entries. He emphasized that successful implementation of this process is a major

From May 30 to June 28, BLOs will conduct door to door visits across the district. The District Collector informed that out of a total of 2,49,972 voters in the 71-Nuapada assembly constituency, the mapping of 2,39,048 has been completed, which is 95.63 percent.

Similarly, in the 72-Khadial assembly constituency, out of a total of 2,55,304 voters, the mapping

of 2,43,848 has been completed, giving a turnout rate of 95.51 percent.

Demands and objections will be accepted from July 5 to August 4 and the final voter list will be published on September 6. The draft voter list will be prepared based on the information received through this form. The Collector urged the public not to believe in rumors or false information related to the SIR process.

Fine of Rs 15 lakh for excessive mining in Shalbeda stone quarry

Keonjhar : The Shalbeda stone quarry under Harichandanpur tehsil in Keonjhar district is being mined illegally at many times the permitted rate, causing the government crores of rupees in lost revenue. After complaints were made, the Minor Mineral Mining Department, Keonjhar, issued a notice to the quarry owner to pay a fine of Rs 15 lakh. The Minor Mining Department has begun investigating the issue as a large amount of stone is being mined in violation of the mining plan. It is alleged that the quarry is located in an area of 4.177 hectares and the

mining plan was violated and the quarry was mined in an unsafe manner. A company called SRSC Infra was given a transit pass for 3120 cubic meters for this quarry, but it is alleged that it has excavated and transported much more than this amount. While the said company carried out the repair work of National Highway 20 from Panikoili to Rimuli, a total of 52,523 cubic meters of stone chips were used. However, it was alleged that an additional 49,403 cubic meters of stone chips were used without permission. During the excavation in the quarry, environmental protection laws were allegedly completely ignored,

endangering wildlife, cattle and people. Although the work has stopped, a proper investigation before surrender is believed to show that the mining was done unsafely, deviating from the mining plan, and involved large-scale revenue fraud. In this regard, Mining Officer Tarini Kumar Singh of the Keonjhar Minor Mineral Mining department said that the company has deposited the fine after it was imposed. The mining work is stopped but the company has not surrendered. Therefore, the investigation is ongoing. According to the rules, the leaseholder must barricade the safety zone and plant trees there. But instead of



doing that, it is alleged that the 7.5-meter safety zone or safety belt of the mine was destroyed and reckless

mining was carried out. The maximum depth the mine can be mined is 6 meters. But since mining is being done

much lower than this, the mine has become dangerous. Now, since there is no barricade in the safety

zone, there is a risk of wild animals and domestic animals falling. But a complete blind eye has

been turned to this aspect. Since this area is not regularly inspected, it is alleged that the leaseholder has deliberately mined more than the permission. The mine boundary has not been fenced and no place has been designated for storing overburden, so it is being dumped here and there, causing widespread environmental pollution and making the mine area unsafe. While the mine is not being managed properly, the company is trying to surrender the quarry without completing the formalities; therefore, a proper investigation is demanded.

Citizens Receive Emergency Alerts For Disaster Warning

New Delhi, 30/5: Indian citizens across the Delhi NCR region received an emergency alert accompanied by a loud beep sound on their phones on Saturday for a disaster warning. The alerts were sent for the second time and appeared as flash messages on mobile devices along with a high-decibel warning tone. Earlier in May, officials had said the alerts are part of routine testing being carried out by the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) to assess the effectiveness and reliability of the emergency communication mechanism ahead of wider operational deployment. The messages informed users that the alerts were part of a test exercise and that no action was required. The Cell Broadcast Alert System has been developed to deliver disaster-related warnings, emergency notifications and public safety messages directly to mobile phones in real time during situations such as earthquakes, tsunamis, lightning strikes, floods



and other emergencies. The alerts are transmitted through the indigenous integrated alert system 'SACHET', developed by the Centre for Development of Telematics (C-DOT), and are based on internationally accepted Common Alerting Protocol standards. The testing follows the launch of the 'Cell

Broadcast Alert System' earlier this month by Union Communications Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia. The system was developed with the support of the NDMA under the guidance of Union Home Minister Amit Shah. The government launched the Cell Broadcast Alert System to

strengthen disaster preparedness and ensure faster dissemination of emergency information to citizens. Officials said such periodic testing exercises are being conducted to evaluate network readiness and ensure seamless delivery of emergency alerts across different mobile networks and handsets.

'No One Above Law': BJP On Rabri Devi's Bungalow Eviction Row

Patna, 30/5: The controversy surrounding the government bungalow at 10 Circular Road in Patna has intensified, with leaders of the ruling NDA and the opposition Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) trading sharp accusations over the issue. The dispute escalated after former Chief Minister and Leader of the Opposition in the Bihar Legislative Council, Rabri Devi, reportedly refused to vacate the residence despite receiving notices from the state government. Reacting strongly to Rabri Devi's stand, Bihar Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) State President Sanjay Saraogi asserted that the rule of law prevails in Bihar and that no individual, regardless of political stature, can place themselves above established laws and regulations. "The government's residences are public assets maintained with taxpayers' money and are allotted strictly according to government rules and procedures," Saraogi said. He argued that defiance of



official orders undermines democratic values and constitutional norms. Saraogi alleged that the politics of the Lalu Prasad Yadav family has long been driven by the perception that political power and government resources are personal entitlements rather than public trusts. He claimed that people in Bihar have witnessed the consequences of such a mindset for decades and are no longer willing to accept it. Criticising Rabri Devi's reported challenge to the government, he said her

remarks reflected disregard for the rule of law and democratic institutions. "In a democracy, the people are supreme. Government rules apply equally to everyone, and therefore, the official residence must be vacated in accordance with the law," Saraogi added. He also raised a political question, asking whether Rabri Devi objected to a member of the Dalit community being allotted a spacious government residence, and whether such accommodation should remain the privilege of only a select few.

Rs 944 Crore Boregaon-Shahpur Corridor 85 Pc Complete: Govt

New Delhi, 30/5: The Boregaon to Shahpur section of NH-753L — a nearly 47 km modern four-lane corridor being developed under Bharatmala Pariyojana — is about 85 per cent complete and will provide a faster, safer inter-state link between Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra, an official statement said on Saturday. The corridor, being built at an estimated cost of Rs 944 crore, will become a major transport axis connecting Indore, Khandwa, Burhanpur, Jalgaon and Chhatrapati Sambhajnagar, the statement from the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways said. The project passes through agriculturally rich regions known for crops such as banana, cotton, soybean and wheat. For local farmers and transporters, these better roads directly translate into faster market access and lower transportation costs. The corridor includes 1 railway over bridge, 7 major bridges, 20 minor bridges, 98 culverts, 3 light vehicle underpasses (LVUPs), 5 small



vehicle underpasses (SVUPs) and 6 vehicular underpasses (VUPs). Further, 19 kms of service roads are being constructed to facilitate safe and convenient movement for local traffic. These will provide connectivity to rural areas, agricultural fields and small settlements, ensuring that local commuters can travel safely without entering the main highway. Khandwa and Burhanpur produce over 1.7 million metric tonnes of bananas annually, sending about 140 heavily loaded

trucks daily to domestic markets and international ports. "For years, these trucks had to depend on narrow, damaged roads that slowed this movement, increased their travel time and made transportation a difficult task," the statement said, adding that the new highway is expected to ease that movement. Gopal Kadutemkar, a local cold storage operator, explained that the biggest advantage of the project will be how much closer Indore and the Malwa region will feel after completion.

HM Amit Shah Calls For Tighter Border Surveillance In Gujarat

Bhuj, 30/5: Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Saturday directed authorities in Gujarat's border districts to adopt a zero-tolerance approach towards unauthorised encroachments, strengthen action against illegal infiltration and financial crime networks, and closely monitor demographic changes, which he described as the most serious challenge facing border regions. Shah was chairing a high-level security review meeting in Bhuj on issues concerning Gujarat's border and coastal districts along the India-Pakistan Border. The meeting was attended by Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel, Deputy Chief Minister Harsh Sanghavi, Chief Secretary Manoj Kumar Das, and Director General of Police K.L.N. Rao, as well as other senior government officials and the District Magistrates and Superintendents of Police of Kutch, Vav-Tharad, and Patan. The review focused on challenges, threats, and emerging concerns in



border areas and examined the role of the state government, particularly district administrations and police authorities, in strengthening border management. Addressing the meeting, Shah said, "Border fencing, maritime border security and the strong political will of the state government have brought about a significant transformation in Gujarat's security landscape," adding that these measures had

resulted in "the complete cessation of infiltration in the state and smuggling on the border". He directed officials to remove all unauthorised encroachments within the 0-15 kilometre belt along the international border and said a "zero-tolerance approach" should be adopted towards such activities. Shah also instructed authorities to maintain a close watch on centres of radicalisation operating in border

regions. Highlighting concerns over demographic shifts, the Home Minister said, "Demographic changes in border districts pose the most serious challenge," and asked District Magistrates to ensure strict monitoring and regular reporting of such developments. At the same time, he described the reverse migration being witnessed in some border areas due to the establishment of industrial units as "a welcome development". Shah said all levels of the administration must work together to identify and remove illegal infiltrators already settled in the region. "Everyone, from police station to patwari, should work in unison to ensure deportation of already settled illegal infiltrators," he said. He also directed local administrations to prepare district-specific standard operating procedures to address unique local challenges. These SOPs, he said, should focus on identifying existing infiltrators and dealing with emerging threats linked to drones and narcotics trafficking.

Delhi On High Alert After Terror Module Linked To Dawood, ISI Busted

New Delhi, 30/5: The Special Cell of the Delhi Police has busted a major module that planned attacks in the national capital and Mumbai. Officials said that they arrested nine persons who also had links with the Dawood Ibrahim syndicate. The arrested nine included persons from Mumbai and Delhi. Some were foreign nationals, too, officials said. Another official said that this is a major bust since these persons were planning high-value attacks. Among their targets were nuclear installations, airports and railway stations. The police have also seized a large cache of arms and ammunition from the arrested persons. The group has been under the radar of the security agencies for a few months. Acting on



actionable intelligence, the module was busted, the police said. The ISI has been increasingly trying to step up homegrown operations to carry out attacks in India. An Intelligence Bureau official said that the ISI has been using the

Dawood Syndicate to set up homegrown modules in India. Following the arrests, a high alert had been declared in Delhi and neighbouring areas. The busting of this module comes just months after the agencies shut down the

Faridabad module that was planning similar strikes in the same areas. The Intelligence Bureau had warned a few weeks back about IED attacks and suicide strikes in Delhi and the neighbouring areas. The agencies had also warned of shooting incidents by lone wolf actors. The district units have been instructed to remain on high alert and coordinate with the Central agencies. Post Operation Sindoor, India changed its doctrine and said that every act of terror from Pakistan will be treated as an act of war and not cross-border terror. Officials say that this is what led Pakistan to set up more homegrown modules in India so that it can maintain the deniability factor after every terror attack.

Navy Chief Admiral Tripathi Briefs PM Modi On Maritime Security, Operational Preparedness

New Delhi, 30/5: Outgoing Indian Navy chief, Admiral Dinesh K. Tripathi, called on Prime Minister Narendra Modi and briefed him on the operational preparedness of the force and the prevailing security environment in the Indian Ocean Region, officials said on Saturday. The meeting took place on Friday, just days before Admiral Tripathi is scheduled to retire from service on May 31. Sharing details of the meeting on X, the Indian Navy said Admiral Tripathi provided the Prime Minister with a comprehensive overview of the force's readiness and the evolving maritime security landscape. "Adm Dinesh K Tripathi, CNS, called on Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi on 29 May 26. Prior to handing over command of the Indian Navy on 31 May 26, CNS briefed the Hon'ble Prime Minister on the operational readiness of the Indian Navy and the overall security situation in the Indian Ocean Region, including the impact of emerging challenges and galloping technology in the maritime domain," it said. The Navy reiterated its commitment towards safeguarding India's maritime interests across the region. "The Indian Navy, as a combat-ready, credible, cohesive and future-ready Atmanirbhar force,



remains committed to safeguarding our national maritime interests — anytime, anywhere, anyhow," the post added. Following Admiral Tripathi's retirement, Krishna Swaminathan will take over as the new Chief of the Naval Staff. Admiral Tripathi took charge as the 26th Chief of the Naval Staff on April 30, 2024. Before assuming the top naval position, he served as the Vice Chief of the Naval Staff and held several important operational and administrative assignments during his distinguished career. An alumnus of Sainik School Rewa and the National Defence Academy, Admiral Tripathi was commissioned into the Indian Navy on July 1, 1985. He specialised in Communication and Electronic Warfare and went on to build a career spanning multiple operational and strategic appointments. His command assignments included leadership of INS Vinash, INS Kirch

and INS Trishul. During his tenure as Commanding Officer of INS Kirch, he played a key role in humanitarian assistance and disaster relief operations following the devastating tsunami of December 2004. His contribution earned him a letter of appreciation from the then-President of Sri Lanka. Over the course of his naval career, Admiral Tripathi also served as Executive Officer of INS Mumbai, Fleet Electronic Warfare Officer, Fleet Communication Officer, and Fleet Operations Officer of the Western Fleet. His staff appointments included positions such as Director of Naval Operations, Principal Director of Network Centric Operations and Principal Director of Naval Plans, giving him extensive exposure to planning, operations and strategic decision-making.

Ghaziabad Teen's Murder: Deputy CM Maurya Assures Strict Action; Probe Underway

New Delhi, 30/5: Uttar Pradesh Deputy Chief Minister, Keshav Prasad Maurya, has assured stringent action in the Ghaziabad youth murder case, stating that the state government is committed to ensuring justice and maintaining law and order. Reacting to the fatal stabbing of a 17-year-old boy in Ghaziabad's Khoda Colony, Maurya said, "Whoever the murderer may be, he will not be spared. He will be traced and found, and strict legal action will be taken to ensure that

the person responsible for the murder is punished according to the law, including capital punishment where applicable. The government is very serious about law and order, and those involved in such crimes will face the strictest possible legal action." The Deputy Chief Minister added, "We have received information that this is a tragic incident. If there are any accused in this matter, legal action will be taken against them." Meanwhile, BJP leader Danish Azad

Ansari said an investigation into the incident is underway. "An investigation is underway into the incident that took place in Ghaziabad, and it is certain that Uttar Pradesh is a state of law and order. Strict action will be taken against whoever is found guilty in this incident," he told IANS. BJP leader Reena Bhati also reacted to the case, stating, "We are only saying that in Khoda Municipal Council, we have never experienced such behaviour before."

Holy Relics Of Lord Buddha's Disciples Arrive In Mongolia Via Special IAF Flight

Ulaanbaatar,30/5: Underscoring shared Buddhist heritage, the holy relics of the chief disciples of the Buddha — Arahant Sariputta and Arahant Mahamoggallana — arrived in the Mongolian capital on Saturday afternoon for a 10-day public exposition at the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery on the occasion of Mongolian Buddha Purnima. The relics, which enjoy the status of the Head of State in terms of protocol and security, arrived in Ulaanbaatar by a special Indian Air Force (IAF) flight from New Delhi, accompanied by a high level delegation led by Assam Governor Lakshman Prasad Acharya. The nearly 45-member delegation also includes senior officers and reputed monks from India and Sri Lanka. According to the Indian Embassy in Mongolia, the International Buddhist Confederation (IBC) is also actively involved in the organisation of the important exposition. Together, the Mahabodhi Society of Sri Lanka, National Museum of India under the Ministry of Culture in



association with the Government of Madhya Pradesh, brought the holy relics to Mongolia at the request of the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery. "India and Mongolia are strategic partners and spiritual siblings with deep civilization linkages due to Buddhism. In this context, the exposition is a good opportunity for the followers of Buddhism in Mongolia to pay their tributes to the relics of Lord Buddha's two chief disciples," the Indian Embassy in Ulaanbaatar mentioned. On the sidelines of the exposition, the National Museum of India and IBC would also be organising a special exhibition on

Buddhism. "The Government of Mongolia is extending the necessary support for the exposition of the holy relics. The Gandan Tegchenling Monastery is looking after the religious aspects of the exposition commensurate with the special high status of the relics. Devotees from all over Mongolia will visit the Monastery to pay their tributes. The exposition of the holy relics will further strengthen the existing spiritual bond between India and Mongolia," the Indian Embassy highlighted. The exposition, which begins on May 31 — the Mongolian Buddha

Purnima — and continues till June 10, was announced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi during the State Visit of Mongolian President Khurelsukh Ukhnaa to India in October 2025. "The relationship between India and Mongolia is not merely diplomatic — it is a bond of warmth and spirituality. The true depth and breadth of our relationship is reflected in our people-to-people ties. For centuries, both countries have been bound by the thread of Buddhism, which has led to us being called spiritual siblings. Today, to further strengthen this tradition and give new strength to our historical ties, we have taken several important decisions," PM Modi stated while addressing a joint press meet with the Mongolian President Khurelsukh Ukhnaa following their talks at the Hyderabad House in New Delhi on October 14. "I am pleased to announce that next year, the holy relics of two great disciples of Lord Buddha — Sariputra and Maudgalyayana — will be sent from India to Mongolia.

Press Freedom Group Condemns Jailing Of Senior Hong Kong Journalist, Warns Of 'Dangerous Precedent'

Paris,30/5: A leading international press freedom organisation strongly condemned the imprisonment of a senior journalist and former chairman of the Hong Kong Journalists Association (HKJA), Ronson Chan, on charges of "obstructing a police officer", warning that the ruling sets a "dangerous precedent" and undermines press freedom in Hong Kong. According to Reporters Without Borders (RSF), Chan, former deputy assignment editor of the now-defunct Hong Kong-based Stand News, lost his appeal against the conviction for "obstructing a police officer" on Friday and was sentenced to five days in prison, which took effect immediately. The group stated that Chan was initially arrested in September 2022 while covering a homeowners' meeting at a residential estate in Hong Kong's Mong Kok area for independent media Channel C, after questioning a plainclothes police officer who attempted to obstruct his reporting, alleging Chan was acting "suspiciously". "The



imprisonment of Ronson Chan, a leading figure in independent journalism in Hong Kong, on trumped-up charges, demonstrates how far the authorities are willing to go to silence independent media. The verdict sets a dangerous precedent, effectively giving the police a free hand and further eroding already dismantled press freedoms," said Aleksandra Bielakowska, Advocacy Manager, RSF Asia Pacific. The group noted that Chan previously served as a deputy assignment editor at Stand News, a non-profit Chinese-language news outlet once regarded as the second most influential

independent media outlet after Apple Daily. The publication, it said, was forced to shut down following a police raid in 2021, during which six of its journalists were arrested, while editor-in-chief Chung Pui-kuen and Patrick Lam were later sentenced to prison terms. Meanwhile, the RSF highlighted that HJKA — a non-profit organisation dedicated to protecting press freedom and supporting journalism in Hong Kong — since 1968, has been subjected to numerous attacks over the past decade by the government and pro-Beijing supporters.

Brahmos Cruise Missile Deal With Vietnam Already Signed: Defence Secretary

Singapore,30/5: Highlighting India's expanding expertise in missile manufacturing and increasing outreach, Defence Secretary Rajesh Kumar Singh on Saturday announced that a BrahMos missile deal has already been signed with Vietnam with another similar agreement with Indonesia currently in the final stages. "My understanding is that with both Indonesia and with Vietnam, the deal is in the final stages. In fact, for Vietnam, I understand that it has already been signed, probably not publicly announced, but it's already been signed. Obviously, you are in the category of friendly foreign countries with whom we would be happy to share this kind of advanced technology," Singh said while responding to a question from a Vietnamese delegate during a media event held on the sidelines of the Shangri-La Dialogue in Singapore. With the Philippines being the first buyer of supersonic cruise missiles jointly produced by India and Russia, Defence Secretary Singh asserted that India has a strong commitment to the ASEAN nations. "We treat you all as friendly foreign countries with whom we can share advanced



defence technology," he told the gathering in Singapore. The Philippines received the first batch of the BrahMos missiles in 2024, becoming India's first customer of the missile, while India delivered the second batch of the missiles in April 2025. Earlier this month, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh travelled to Hanoi, holding extensive discussions with his Vietnamese counterpart, General Phan Van Giang, on the expanding defence partnership between both nations and discussing ways to deepen cooperation in maritime security, defence industry, training, and regional stability. Singh's visit marked 10 years of the Comprehensive

Strategic Partnership between the two nations, which was upgraded to Enhanced Comprehensive Strategic Partnership during the State visit of Vietnamese President To Lam earlier this month. During his visit, he also called on the Vietnamese President and reaffirmed India's commitment to strengthening cooperation under the Enhanced Comprehensive Strategic Partnership between the two nations. "India and Vietnam share a strong bond rooted in mutual trust, shared values and close cooperation in defence, security and regional stability," the Defence Minister wrote in a post on X after the meeting.

India, Australia Review Strategic Defence Cooperation During Bilateral Talks

Singapore,30/5: Defence Secretary Rajesh Kumar Singh on Saturday held bilateral discussions here with his Australian counterpart, Meghan Quinn. During the meeting, on the sidelines of the Shangri-La Dialogue, both sides reviewed the progress of the India-Australia Comprehensive Strategic Partnership, discussed upcoming high-level engagements, and explored opportunities to further strengthen defence cooperation in areas of mutual interest. "Defence Secretary Shri Rajesh Kumar Singh held bilateral discussions with Defence Secretary Australia Ms Meghan Quinn. Both sides reviewed the progress of the India-Australia Comprehensive Strategic Partnership, discussed forthcoming high-level engagements, and explored avenues to further strengthen Defence Cooperation in areas of mutual interest," the Defence Ministry said in a post on X. On Friday, Singh met Canada's Senior Associate Deputy Minister of National Defence, Kelvin Brosseau, on the sidelines of the dialogue. "Both sides discussed



ways to strengthen India-Canada defence cooperation and explored opportunities for deeper collaboration across key domains, reflecting the growing convergence of strategic interests between the two nations," the Ministry of Defence's Directorate of Public Relations said in a post on X. Singh also met Seychelles' Chief of Defence Forces Major General Micheal Rosette and discussed ways to further strengthen defence cooperation and maritime security collaboration in the Indian Ocean Region, it said, adding: "...The interaction reaffirmed India's

commitment to advancing peace, security and stability with its trusted partners in the region". The Shangri-La Dialogue, being held in Singapore, features plenary debates led by government ministers and important opportunities for bilateral discussions among delegations. Earlier on Friday, the Defence Secretary held a meeting with the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) Military Committee's Chair, Admiral Giuseppe Cavo Dragone, with discussions focused on enhancing strategic dialogue and evolving global

security challenges, the Defence Ministry said, adding that the "interaction reaffirmed India's commitment to constructive engagement with key multilateral defence organisations". Singh also met US Indo-Pacific Command Commander Admiral Samuel J Paparo, with discussions focused on strengthening military-to-military cooperation, enhancing collaboration in the Indo-Pacific and addressing emerging security challenges, "reaffirming the shared commitment towards deepening India-US strategic defence ties", the directorate posted on X. On the sidelines of the Shangri-La Dialogue, the Defence Secretary engaged with leading think tanks and academia on strengthening the Indo-Pacific security architecture, defence industrial collaboration and emerging technology partnerships." Addressing a distinguished gathering on 'India's Defence Diplomacy for a Stable, Secure and Inclusive Indo-Pacific', he shared India's vision for regional security and strategic engagement. High Commissioner of India to Singapore Dr Shilpak Ambule also joined the interaction," the Directorate of Public Relations posted on X.

Conflict-Related Sexual Violence Up Sharply Worldwide In 2025: UN Report

United Nations,30/5: Verified cases of conflict-related sexual violence more than doubled globally in 2025 over the previous year, according to a UN report. "Cases of conflict-related sexual violence verified by the United Nations in 2025 rose sharply from 2024, marked by extreme brutality, and overwhelmingly targeted women and girls," said the annual report of the UN secretary-general. A total of 9,788 cases of conflict-related sexual violence were documented in 2025, more than doubling the figure from 2024 (with 4,617 cases), according to the report, which was submitted to the Security Council on Thursday and was made available to the press on Friday, Xinhua news agency reported. The report notes that the cases of conflict-related sexual violence should be understood not as the full picture, as violations remained largely unseen and underreported when ongoing



conflict, insecurity, and restrictions on humanitarian access increasingly obstructed reporting and documentation, which was further undermined by mission drawdowns and budget cuts in which specialised capacity on gender and women's protection were often the first to be reduced. A total of 77 parties, including state and non-

state actors, are listed for cases of conflict-related sexual violence in this 17th annual report, which covers 21 conflict-affected countries for which information verified by the United Nations was available. Two new state actors are listed: the Israeli armed and security forces, and the Russian armed and security forces. Three

new non-state actors operating in the Democratic Republic of the Congo are listed in this report. The report says that in 2025, documented cases of sexual violence as a tactic of war, torture, terrorism and political repression surged, while multiple and overlapping political, security and humanitarian crises worsened. Civilians were

targeted with rape, gang rape, abductions and sexual slavery by state and non-state actors. Sexual violence and exploitation in the context of abduction and trafficking in persons continued to be observed as a tactic of terrorism. Displaced, refugee and migrant women and girls faced elevated risks of sexual violence. Sexual violence was perpetrated in detention in multiple settings, such as in Israel and the State of Palestine, Russia and Ukraine, according to the report. Impunity for conflict-related sexual violence persisted in 2025. Overall, the level of compliance by parties to conflict with applicable international norms remained low. Over 65 per cent of the parties listed in the annex to the present report are persistent perpetrators, appearing in the annex for five or more years without taking remedial or corrective action, according to the report.

Trump Delays Decision On Iran Deal After Situation Room Talks

Washington,30/5: US President Donald Trump ended a two-hour Situation Room meeting on a proposed Iran agreement without announcing a decision, media reports said. Trump had earlier said he would make a "final determination" on a proposal aimed at extending a ceasefire with Iran, reopening the Strait of Hormuz and launching negotiations over Tehran's nuclear programme. However, after the meeting concluded, the White House offered no indication that a final decision had been reached. CNN reported that a White House official said only that the meeting had lasted about two hours and reiterated the administration's position that Iran must never possess a nuclear weapon. According to The Washington Post, the proposed memorandum of understanding would extend the current ceasefire for 60 days while Washington and Tehran negotiate details of a broader agreement, including the future of Iran's enriched uranium stockpile. Before the meeting, Trump outlined conditions he said Iran would need to meet, including

reopening the Strait of Hormuz, removing mines from the waterway, agreeing never to develop a nuclear weapon and allowing the United States to remove or destroy highly enriched uranium. Iran signalled that negotiations remain incomplete. CNN reported that Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Esmail Baghaei said contacts between Tehran and Washington were continuing but that a memorandum of understanding had not yet been finalised. The New York Times separately reported that Iranian officials continue to object to several U.S. demands and that internal opposition from hard-line factions in Tehran remains a hurdle to any agreement. Despite the lack of a final announcement, officials on both sides appeared to suggest that negotiations were continuing. The Washington Post reported that Iranian negotiators are seeking the release of frozen assets and relief from economic restrictions, while US officials continue to push for measures addressing Iran's nuclear activities and regional security concerns.

Nifty, Sensex End Lower This Week Over Below-Normal Monsoon Forecast, FII Selling

Mumbai,30/5: The Indian equity benchmarks posted notable losses during the week due to sustained FII selling and below-normal monsoon forecast, causing fears of food inflation. Nifty lost 0.72 per cent during the week and dipped 1.50 per cent on the last trading day to reach 23,547. At close, Sensex was down 1,092 points or 1.44 percent at 74,775. It declined 0.85 per cent during the week. Large caps remained under pressure even as the broader market demonstrated meaningful resilience as midcaps briefly touched its all-time high. "PSU Banks led on mark-to-market treasury gains from yield compression while autos and metals benefited from crude's sharp decline. FMCG, healthcare, and consumer durables declined as defensive premiums unwound on improving risk appetite," an analyst said. MSCI index rebalancing-related adjustments also triggered substantial institutional selling in the last trading session. Overall, the macro backdrop is more constructive than it was a fortnight ago, but confirmation through policy clarity, monsoon normalisation,



and geopolitical de-escalation is needed before large cap conviction builds into the next meaningful leg higher, market participants said. Crude oil staged a sharp weekly decline driven by optimism around a potential US-Iran diplomatic breakthrough but IMD's below-normal monsoon forecast offset resultant gains. The rupee firmed modestly through the week after RBI's commentary signalling that the INR remains

undervalued. Cumulative outflows by foreign institutional investors (FIIs) stood at approximately Rs 23,700 crore during the week, they said. Broad market indices showed divergence with benchmark indices, as Nifty Midcap100 added 0.54 per cent, while Nifty Smallcap100 gained 1.02 per cent during the week. Nifty 50 is expected to see the 24,000-24,100 region as a strong resistance zone and the 23,300-23,000 region

remains a crucial support area, market participants said. In Bank Nifty, immediate resistance is placed around the 54,600-54,800 zone and the 54,200-54,000 region continues to act as an immediate support zone. Investors remain keen on cues from the upcoming RBI monetary policy decision, India's GDP data release, Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) and the Index of Industrial Production (IIP) data.

India-Bound Tanker Crosses Hormuz Safely With 270,000 Tonnes Of Oil

New Delhi,30/5: Nissos Keros, a Marshall Islands-flagged crude oil tanker carrying approximately 270,000 MT of crude oil cargo for India, safely crossed the Strait of Hormuz and is expected to arrive at Visakhapatnam on June 3, according to the official update issued on Friday. All oil refineries in the country are operating at high capacity with adequate crude inventories, while sufficient stocks of petrol and diesel are being maintained. Domestic LPG production from refineries has been increased to about 52 TMT/day to support domestic consumption, the statement said. Meanwhile, during the last four days, about 1.80 crore LPG cylinders were delivered against bookings of around 1.78 crore cylinders. Online LPG cylinder bookings increased to



about 99 per cent on Thursday, while Delivery Authentication Code (DAC) deliveries based on registered mobile numbers of consumers have increased to about 96 per cent to prevent diversion. Citizens are advised to avoid panic purchase of petrol, diesel and LPG as the Government is making all efforts to ensure availability. People are urged to beware of rumours and rely on official

sources for correct information. LPG consumers are requested to use digital booking platforms and avoid visiting distributors. Citizens are encouraged to use alternative fuels such as PNG and electric or induction cooktops. All petrol pumps are operating normally across the country. Unusually high sales and heavy crowding have been observed at retail outlets in certain areas. However, it

is informed that there are adequate stocks of petrol and diesel available at all petrol pumps in the country, the statement said. Bulk and industrial consumers are requested to procure diesel from authorised procurement channels. All citizens are requested to make necessary efforts to conserve energy in their daily use during the current situation. The Centre has also asked the States to monitor and review district-wise diesel and petrol offtake patterns, intensify inspections and enforcement activities in vulnerable areas and along major transportation/industrial corridors to prevent unauthorised procurement of diesel through retail outlets by industrial and commercial consumers, and initiate prompt penal action against violators, the statement added.

Finance ministry flags oil, inflation and monsoon risks in monthly economic report

New Delhi, May 30: India's near-term economic outlook remains one of "cautious resilience" as domestic fundamentals hold up despite intensifying global shocks from the West Asia conflict, the Department of Economic Affairs said Saturday in its Monthly Economic Review for May. While PMIs, labour market and forex reserves provide insulation, the department flagged elevated crude prices, tightening financial conditions and a below-normal monsoon as key risks to consumption and inflation in the months ahead. "The near-term outlook for the Indian economy is one of cautious resilience," the Department of Economic Affairs noted. "Domestic fundamentals remain broadly intact, manufacturing and services PMIs are in expansionary territory, the labour market is stable, and foreign exchange reserves provide meaningful insulation against external shocks." The department added that the global environment has become "materially more challenging" since the onset of the West Asia conflict, with elevated crude prices and weakening growth momentum across major economies posing headwinds

India "cannot fully insulate itself from." Inflation dynamics warrant vigilance, according to the DEA review. "The current divergence between retail inflation and wholesale prices signals that upstream cost pressures are building, and the passthrough to consumers, while limited so far, may not be far behind," it said. Retail inflation rose only marginally to 3.48% in April 2026 and stayed below RBI's target, but wholesale inflation accelerated sharply to 8.3%, driven by global energy prices, currency depreciation and low base effect. The department warned that the recent hike in petrol and diesel prices "may activate both direct and indirect transmission channels," and a deficient monsoon could add food price pressures on top of energy-driven ones. Industrial activity showed mixed signals in April 2026. The DEA observed that "resilience in cement, steel, and electricity generation continued to support overall momentum, reflecting sustained domestic demand from infrastructure and construction activity." The HSBC India Manufacturing PMI stayed in expansionary territory even as

rising input costs weighed on conditions. Export orders, employment and investment commitments in automobiles, semiconductors, electronics and defence manufacturing pointed to underlying resilience. Gross FDI inflows reached a historical peak of \$94.5 billion in FY26, "indicating continued long-term investor interest," while services exports growth narrowed the trade deficit, the department highlighted. The report said "the duration of the Strait of Hormuz disruption remains the single most consequential variable for India's external and price outlook." With the IMD projecting monsoon rainfall at around 92% of the long-period average, the department cautioned that "any significant rainfall deficit coupled with current geopolitical conditions could translate into food inflation, weakening rural demand and aggregate growth." It concluded that navigating FY27 "will require agility across monetary, fiscal and structural dimensions to safeguard growth momentum and keep inflation durably anchored, even as the global environment remains uncertain.

Centre waives customs duty on cotton imports from June 1 to Oct 31

New Delhi, 30/5: The Central Government has exempted customs duty on cotton imports for a five-month period beginning June 1, 2026, in a move aimed at improving cotton availability for the domestic textile sector and reducing input costs for manufacturers. The decision was notified by the Ministry of Finance through a notification issued on Saturday. The notification exempts imported cotton from the entire basic customs duty as well as the Agriculture Infrastructure and Development Cess levied on the commodity. According to the notification, the exemption will remain in force from June 1, 2026, up to and including October 31, 2026. The Finance Ministry said the measure has been introduced "to augment availability of cotton for the Indian textile sector." Explaining the rationale behind the decision, the ministry said the temporary duty exemption is expected to lower raw material costs across



the textile value chain." The temporary duty exemption is expected to reduce input costs across the textile and apparel sector, thereby providing a targeted relief to manufacturers and consumers, while also keeping the interests of domestic farmers in mind," the Ministry said in a statement. It said the move is expected to support the performance of the domestic textile industry, particularly small and medium

enterprises that depend on stable cotton supplies. "Overall, the measure is anticipated to have a positive impact on the performance of the domestic textile industry, especially the small and medium enterprises, ensuring better availability of cotton in the market," it added. The customs notification was issued by the Department of Revenue under powers conferred by the Customs Act,

1962 and the Finance Act, 2021. It stated that the government was satisfied that granting the exemption was necessary in the public interest. India's textile and apparel sector is one of the country's largest manufacturing industries and a major consumer of cotton. Industry participants have often sought lower import costs during periods of tight domestic supplies and elevated raw material prices.

Gold Dips 1.36 PC This Week Over Stable Dollar, Fed Rate Hike Expectation

New Delhi,30/5: Gold prices dipped 1.36 per cent during the week as a stable dollar and stronger than expected US inflation data reinforced expectations that the US Federal Reserve may raise interest rates later this year. On Friday, MCX gold June futures dipped 0.59 per cent while MCX silver May futures lost 0.94 per cent. Currently, gold futures stand at Rs 1,56,000, while silver futures at Rs 2,67,000 per kg. The price of 10 grams of 24-carat gold was at Rs 1,56,463 on Friday down from Rs 1,58,622 seen on Monday market opening, according to data published by the India Bullion and Jewellers Association (IBJA). The dollar index rose about 0.10 per cent, while US personal consumption expenditures (PCE) rose 3.8 per cent (year on year) in April, the fastest pace since May 2023, bolstering expectations of US Fed rate hikes this year. "Gold and silver continue to attract selective safe-haven and value-oriented



buying near key technical levels, although upside momentum remains closely linked to expectations surrounding US monetary policy, bond yields and the trajectory of the US dollar," an analyst said. Higher energy prices fuel inflationary pressure increasing the likelihood of Fed tightening, denting gold's appeal as investors gravitate toward yield-bearing assets. The recent US Fed's meeting minutes showed that more officials are now open to the possibility that they may need to hike rates. COMEX Gold

is currently trading in the \$4,570-\$4,600 range, with weekly price action continuing to reflect a consolidation phase and a cautious undertone, he added. Technically, immediate resistance is placed in the \$4,600-\$4,650 region and the \$4,400-\$4,350 range continues to serve as a critical support area, market participants said. For MCX Gold, immediate resistance is placed in the Rs 1,60,000 to Rs 1,62,000 range and the Rs 1,54,000-Rs 1,52,000 region continues to act as a critical support base.

RBI, Vietnam Central Bank Sign MoU To Boost Digital Payments, Cross-Border QR Transactions

New Delhi,30/5: India and Vietnam have taken a major step towards strengthening cooperation in digital payments and financial innovation, with the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) and the State Bank of Vietnam (SBV) signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), the Ministry of Finance said on Friday. The agreement, signed with the approval of the Union Cabinet, aims to deepen collaboration in areas such as financial innovation, regulatory coordination, information sharing, and digital payment systems. A key focus of the MoU is the development of payment system connectivity to enable cross-border QR code-based merchant payments between the two countries. The MoU is being seen as a forward-looking initiative that could enhance bilateral financial ties while positioning India as a major fintech hub in the region. It is expected to improve the efficiency of cross-border transactions by making payments more transparent, real-time, convenient, and cost-effective for users and businesses in both



countries. According to the details of the agreement, the RBI and the SBV will cooperate on sharing information related to emerging market trends, innovative technologies, standards and best practices in digital payments, and regulatory frameworks governing financial innovation. The arrangement will also support the development and oversight of digital payment systems in financial services. The agreement provides a broad framework for collaboration and implementation support, in line with the laws and regulations applicable in both

countries. It also opens the door for potential joint innovation programmes and projects in the future. Officials said the payment connectivity initiative is expected to facilitate trade and tourism between India and Vietnam, while creating greater export opportunities for Indian businesses. The framework will also help maintain smooth cross-border financial activities through cooperation in fast payment systems, messaging systems, and card switches. The MoU was signed by the Deputy Governors of the RBI and the SBV.

'About evolved India, empowering villages': Ram Charan recalls telling PM Modi about film Peddi

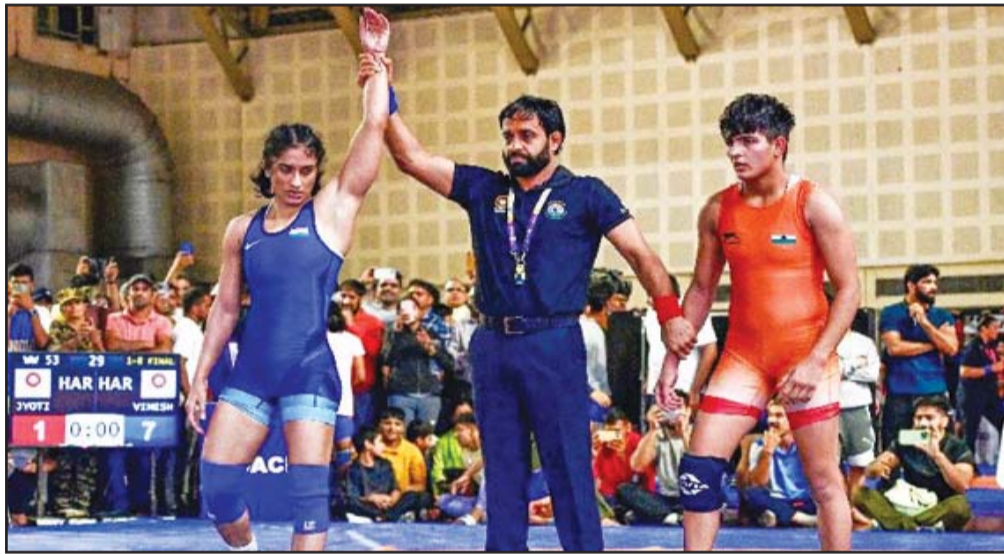

In her first match against Jyoti, Vinesh began cautiously and used standing wrestling moves to extend her lead to 7-0 before Jyoti secured a late push-out point to avoid a shutout. This win sets up a second-round match against Nishu, who advanced after defeating Riya by fall. If the matches proceed as drawn, Vinesh and fellow star wrestler Antim Panghal are on track for a highly anticipated final. However, Vinesh is likely to meet the skilled Meenakshi Goyat in



from Jyoti. Taking advantage of the counter, Vinesh executed two quick scoring moves to extend her lead to 7-0 before Jyoti secured a late push-out point to avoid a shutout. After further discussions and intervention from the federation's leaders, the WFI changed their mind on Saturday morning and permitted her to enter the 53kg trials.

From Strong Start To Final Showdown: RCB's Road To IPL 2026 Title Clash

New Delhi, 30/5: Defending champions Royal Challengers Bengaluru (RCB) will take inspiration from their amazing journey in the Indian Premier League (IPL) 2026 league stage and the Qualifier 1 when they take on 2022 winners Gujarat Titans in the final at the Narendra Modi Stadium in Ahmedabad on Sunday. After lifting their maiden IPL trophy last year, RCB are set to face the challenge of defending the crown for the first time in franchise history. The Rajat Patidar-led side responded in impressive fashion, finishing at the top of the points table with nine wins from 14 league matches before sealing a place in the final with a convincing victory over the Gujarat Titans in Qualifier 1. RCB made an immediate statement at the start of the season. They opened their campaign with a successful chase against Sunrisers

The middle phase of the season brought another challenge. Consecutive losses against Gujarat Titans and Lucknow Super Giants left RCB needing a strong finish to secure a playoff berth.

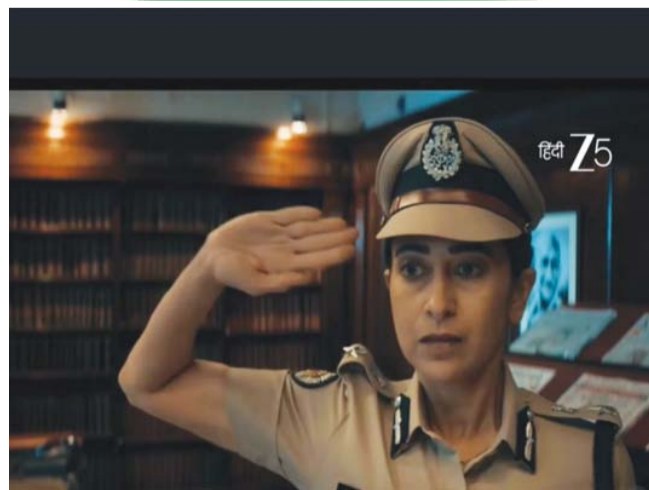
Trailer of Karisma Kapoor's 'Brown' series unveiled, actress dons cop role
