## Breaking Record

NARENDRA MODI has become India's longest continuously serving democratically elected Prime Minister. It's a creditable milestone. Twelve years at the helm have also seen the Bharatiya Janata Party exponentially expand its footprint across the length and breadth of the country. Three consecutive Lok Sabha victories exemplify a remarkable political consolidation, aided in no small measure by an uninspiring Opposition. West Bengal is just the latest in the BJP's long list of unlikely electoral domination in regions where it once had limited resonance. For the party, Prime Minister Modi is the mascot that seldom fails the EVM test, while Home Minister Amit Shah promises big and delivers. The winning formula is a combination of personal charisma and relentless vote bank micro-management.

Even his staunchest critics would admit that Prime Minister Modi exudes energy and passion that is difficult to match. Criticism is but an essential component of a vibrant democracy. The Modi government can rightly pat itself on the back for a whole range of schemes, initiatives and decisive actions. There is visible vibrancy in several sectors, but the possibilities are endless. Much more is within reach, and expected from a stable, strong government. 'Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas, Sabka Vishwas' remains the engine and the guiding principle to realise the Viskit Bharat dream, but only if it stays true to its name. Partisanship and majoritarianism are self-damaging. The country seems to be in a constant state of confrontation that continues to weaken social cohesion, the foundational cornerstone of economic growth. It is undesirable, pointless and bothersome.

As the West Asia conflict unravels, India, the world's fastest-growing major economy, is no longer so popular among global investors. The march ahead is tough. Like the Zojila project, that was once unthinkable, there is hopefully light at the end of the tunnel.

## Bhakra Reservoir

THE Bhakra Beas Management Board's (BBMB) advisory urging Punjab and Haryana to draw more water from the Bhakra reservoir should serve as a wake-up call on the growing complexities of water management in north India. Far from being a routine operational decision, it reflects the pressures of climate uncertainty, unsustainable agricultural practices and fragile inter-state cooperation. The reservoir level currently stands at 1,578.07 ft — more than 21 ft higher than at the same time last year. With only about 102 ft of vertical buffer remaining before the full reservoir level, the margin for error is narrowing as the monsoon approaches. Snowmelt from the Himalayas and extreme rainfall events could rapidly transform abundance into vulnerability.

When available surface water is not efficiently distributed, reservoirs are forced to retain larger volumes, shrinking the flood cushion needed to absorb sudden inflows. The lessons of the devastating floods of 2023 should not be forgotten. Delayed releases and disputes over reservoir operations fuelled political acrimony and raised questions about preparedness. Dam management cannot focus solely on power generation. Flood moderation must be an equally important objective.

Irrigation departments must ensure timely delivery of canal water, particularly to tail-end farmers, allowing greater reliance on surface irrigation and reducing pressure on depleting aquifers. Partner states, meanwhile, must coordinate reservoir operations with foresight. Water abundance should strengthen resilience, not heighten risk. Clearing reservoir space today is the best insurance against tomorrow's climate uncertainties.

# Water, the Elixir of Life

King Bhagirath was instrumental in bringing the Ganga to Earth to ensure that the holy water touches his ancestors and their souls attain moksha. But Mother Ganga flows from the Himalayas through the plains and, in the process, gives life to millions on its long, arduous journey. That is the story of water (H<sub>2</sub>O). Today, water is the most precious commodity. In other words, water is life. Planet Earth is 70% water. The human body consists of 70% water. The world's most populous country, India, has 18% of the world's population but only 4% of the world's available freshwater resources. Water has a great impact on human life, vegetation, energy, agriculture, and thus is all-pervasive. Water has strategic importance in our sustainability and is paramount. Today, water is a scarce commodity, and in future, it will be a water war for water-related equity and social justice.

Water shapes India's destiny profoundly. Water nourishes farms, sustains our population and cities, powers our industries, and is instrumental in triggering our economic activities. More of it means flood, less of it is drought. The thread that binds us together. But at the same time, our continuous vulnerabilities in the shape of agrarian distress, urban fragility, nutritional imbalance, and climate risk are integrally connected with water. Water for years has been facing an environmental concern. Water is a macroeconomic variable, increasing productivity and production, financial stability, public health, and overall our consummate resilience. What needs to be done is how we optimally use water, optimally, without a deepening ecological crisis. The Green Revolution was an historic achievement in water that raised India's food security. The cropping pattern and its impact on water use is a beautiful study in the utilisation of water resources. Being an integral part of Agriculture, it aids in improving soil health and moisture retention and ensures nutritional security for plant health.

As the first drop of water falls down, it irrigates the soil, ignites passions, and becomes a time for our celebration, with children dancing in the rain, musicians performing classical monsoon ragas. The best songs are an Ode to love like Kalidas' Meghdutam. The monsoon pours in 70 to 90 p% of water, as a result of the Southwest monsoon. The rainfall in 2025 was in



excess of the long-term average. But in the regions where the rainfall is more, it had, caused the breaking of the river embankment, floods, landslides, cloud bursts, producing 1 kg of rice requires an average of 2500 litres of water. The global average of 1 kg of boneless meat requires 15400 litres of water, chicken 4300 litres, 1kg of wheat requires 1800 litres of water, and 1kg rice requires 2500 litres of water.

The water crisis is compounding day by day. Water bodies are drying up. There is hardly any well in any village. You do not see a spring. Rivers are dead. Flora, fauna, and green vegetation are on the wane. Production and productivity are declining. The yields are miserable. All forms of traditional fishes other microorganisms are extinct as the water bodies no longer hold water. Biodiversity is at stake. The ecological disturbance does not augur well for the planet. The dry spell makes the situation worse and leads to an environmental disaster. As water is channelised for industrial production, Agriculture becomes the first casualty, and prices heat up, stoking an inflationary spiral.

The heat wave is intense, and this year, it is already an alarming situation, and with the entry of El Niño, water scarcity would be profound. Because of intense heat, dams are also drying up, and reservoirs are gasping. The water requirement, even for the human body, is not maintainable. It is going to be a potential hazard going ahead. The soaring temperature, the humid atmosphere make life miserable. Water contamination, because of the discharge of industrial waste. Potable water is also

not suitable for human consumption, because of the seepage of industrial waste.

Production of hydropower is a challenge. Centre for Science and Environment is very critical of the water situation. Since groundwater is declining due to excessive use for irrigation, water availability is a challenge. CSE says, "We have to reclaim our bond with nature. The water stress is real. A single cotton banyan requires the consumption of 2700 litres of water, and that speaks to the enormity of the problem. This is equivalent to one person's drinking water use for 2.5 years. We have to reduce conspicuous consumption to save water. It is incredibly true that people will go to war over the issue of water. This is going to happen as the water system is collapsing, under the pressure of the climate crisis and decades of mindless overuse and tapping of groundwater. Bangladesh's water has been a difficult commodity, and studies show that 82% of the region is under water stress.

Therefore, irrigation is more expensive and less reliable as ground water level is receding. The crisis has reached a turning point where water extraction has to be banned. Farmers are in disarray. The Rigveda says that water is revered as a divine, primeval source of all life energy. Disaster can strike anytime; we have to analyse the risk paradigm and model our public policy by tweaking water conservation policy, which is the need of the hour. As Himalayan glaciers melt, the river Ganga may go dry sooner or later. This is a clarion call for the future. Realising the

water crisis, investments are now growing for the extraction of water, water treatment, and water preservation is a more pressing challenge. But the integration of major rivers to harvest the excess water before it goes to Sea is lost in the dreary desert of bureaucratic meddling.

The Ministry of Jal Shakti has gone for Jal Shakti Abhiyan, for rainwater harvesting, the Atal Bhujal Yojana for community led sustainable ground water management, and the Mission Amrit Sarovar to construct and rejuvenate 50000+ waterbodies, nationwide. The water productivity campaign, such as "more crop per drop" under the PMKSY, is skewed to irrigated crops. Crops like millets and pulses, signifying dryland farming, are better adapted to such agrochemical conditions. They provide greater nutritional returns per drop of water. Higher resilience to erratic rainfall. Green water-based agriculture provides tangible economic gains. Groundwater, which supplies 60% of irrigation needs, has to be prudently used in a water-stressed economy and natural ecosystem. However, water and its benefits and their undervalued remain unappreciated.

The UN report on the water challenge to weed out structural inequities made a survey in 138 developing countries and found that 84 countries comprising 2 billion people do not have access to better water. Therefore, the UN slogan is Water for all people, Equal rights and opportunities for all, without gender discrimination. Hence, the need for inclusive water governance. The Sustainable Development Goals 2030 have six indicators, such as drinking water, sanitation and hygiene, wastewater, water quality, water use efficiency, water stress, water management, ecosystems, institutional, and crosscutting. Let us realise that water could become

a catalyst for sustainable economic transformation. Water is nature's enduring GIFT. In an era where food security is paramount, water becomes more precious. In 2001, each Indian had the requirement of 1816 cubic metres of fresh water; this dropped to roughly 1486 cubic metres, which is far below the world average requirement of 1700 cubic metres. The levels will drop further to under 1200 cubic metres, veering close to water scarcity of 1000 cubic metres. That speaks the truth, and we have to prepare to fight it out. Water is the elixir of life.

## Think about it: What makes a good life?

A great career, financial success, a nice family, loads of friends, an active social life and exciting holidays make a good life, right? Think again. Often, I have admired the cheerfulness and tranquillity of many of the security guards, cleaners and gardeners at our building. They arrive at work earlier than required, are always very willing to help and they do it with a smile. I have chatted with a couple of them at times and found their approach to life a reminder of what makes a good life.

Firstly, true quality of life is a reflection not of our standard of living but how we experience life within. Secondly, it is a measure of our level of freedom from our volatile emotional-mental states; how well we win over our frequent feelings of anxiety, fear and envy or craving for a different life. I have noticed three principles that contribute to such a good life.

Morality: We cannot be at peace or experience emotional freedom without a clear conscience. A high sense of moral integrity is important for a healthy inner life. Without strength of character, we can easily compromise on 'minor' infractions on integrity. We tell white lies, choose convenience over righteousness and assume that the end somehow justifies the means. It doesn't! The emotional residue of any wrongdoing stays and accumulates in our psyche and manifests itself in one negative emotion or other. For example, guilt results in anxiety, irritability and low self-esteem. Immoral conduct in business or personal life corrupts and weakens us. Choosing to do the right thing strengthens our inner being.

Inner compass: To experience emotional freedom, it's important to live life on our own terms. We feel free when we align our life to our

innate traits, core values and our life's calling. We carry enormous emotional baggage when we are trying to live a life that we believe others expect us to. One of the biggest reasons for stress in our lives is our constant propensity to compare ourselves with others. Living by our inner compass relies on feeling grateful for and at peace with who we are and our circumstances. We don't crave for a different life and choose not to compare ourselves, our life or our progress, with others.

Wisdom around control: One of the factors contributing to our inner suffering is our desire to control outcomes — from advancement at work and children's future to longevity and others' perception of us. Being focussed on goals and doing our best to reach them is healthy. However, with our high achievement-orientation, we routinely obsess about the outcomes. That significantly increases our emotional burden. Wise people know the delicate balance between willpower and letting go. They do their best on what's in their control and are wise enough to let go of the temptation to worry about what's not in their control. That's what can help us overcome our constant yearning for favourable outcomes and fully enjoy the present. It also helps us be compassionate towards ourselves, our colleagues and loved ones.

As you may notice, these principles, while not necessarily easy to live by, are great social equalisers. They are within the reach of almost anyone, irrespective of their financial or social status. That's how some of the staff in my building are happy and peaceful and lead a good inner life. I guess, you and I, can, too!

## You can feel Vrindavan in your heart

Do some places radiate strong spiritual vibrations? Perhaps. For instance, Vrindavan became one such place around the beginning of the 16th century. It was then nothing but a dense forest that began throbbing with deep spiritual vibrations. These were sensed by seekers, who started flocking to Vrindavan. Vallabhacharya, a talented philosopher who introduced the pure non-dualism system, came from Andhra Pradesh. Meera came from Rajasthan, renouncing all royal riches to immerse in the divine longing for Krishna. Surdas, a blind poet, Haridas a renowned Dhrupad singer and many others also moved to Vrindavan, feeling a strong presence of Krishna. Then came Chaitanya, walking on foot from Orissa, in the year 1516. Until this time, Vrindavan had no temples or any other physical evidence of Krishna's association with Vrindavan.

When Chaitanya visited the forests near Mathura, his heart was intoxicated by the intensity of love. He, as if in a trance, could see Krishna performing numerous lilas — acts or pastimes of God — as he walked in the Vrindavan forests. He could identify specific places in Vrindavan associated with each of the lilas. Chaitanya identified three water bodies known as Shyama and Radha Kunda. Here, he could see Krishna performing water sports with his friends. So intense was Chaitanya's realisation, he was dancing with divine joy at all these places. He identified Govardhan hill and saw Krishna holding it on his fingertip to save his village folks from drowning in the lashing rains. At Chira Ghat, Chaitanya heard the divine flute sound played by Krishna under the tree called Vamshi Vat. He would see naughty Krishna sitting on a tree, while gopis were taking a bath in the pool. The gopis only later realised that Krishna had stolen their clothes. Chaitanya would hear the request from each of the gopis to Krishna for the return of their clothes. Chaitanya identified many other spots associated with Krishna.

Chaitanya considered himself lucky to feel Krishna in full glory. As a pure devotee, he wanted everyone including future generations to get drowned in the same feeling. So he noted the precise location of each of the experiences and instructed his disciples to build small temples at each of these places. Most of today's Vrindavan temples have grown from the little temples constructed by Chaitanya's team.

The feel is not limited to the followers of one religion. In 1570, Akbar felt deep spiritual vibrations while listening to the song sung by Swami Haridas — Tansen's guru — at the place called Nidhi Van at the heart of Vrindavan. Vrindavan today attracts seekers from all over who come here to soak in divine love. They owe gratitude to Chaitanya and his team for connecting them to their deeper selves.

# One arrested, one detained in Murder case

Naresh Chandra Pattanayak Keonjhar : Keonjhar police arrested one and detained a minor in a mysterious and sensational murder incident today. In a press meet held in Barbil PS, police confirm this. Child in Conflict with Law (CICL) involved in the commission of the offence. According to police on 9 June at about 1:30 PM, police got information about a dead body of an unknown person was lying inside a trench near Munda Sahi, close to a gas plant, approximately 800 metres away from NH-520. After examining several witnesses, police collected technical as well as scientific evidence about the incident.

Through sustained efforts, police identified the the as Badal Singh (18), S/o Binod Singh of Village Hudisahi under Joda police station of Keonjhar District.

After completion of all legal formalities and post-mortem examination, the dead body was handedover to the family



members of the deceased. During

investigation police further revealed the involvement of

two persons in the crime out of which one is

found to be a Child in Conflict with Law (CICL).

Investigation disclosed that the motive behind the murder was a dispute regarding the distribution of stolen property. It came to light that the deceased and both accused persons were allegedly involved in illegal activities such as theft and robbery. During the interrogation police further revealed that the CICL had taken possession of the deceased's mobile phone and kept it with him for several days. On 08 June, all three met at the residence of the CICL at Joda, where the mobile phone was returned to the deceased. Thereafter, they proceeded to the place of occurrence during the evening and consumed liquor and ganja together.

When the deceased fell

asleep due to heavy intoxication, accused Sanjay Munda and the CICL allegedly took advantage of the situation and repeatedly assaulted him on the head with stones, resulting in his death. After committing the offence, they dragged the body into a nearby trench and removed the deceased's mobile phone from his pocket. "During interrogation, the accused confessed to his involvement in the crime and led the investigating team to the recovery of the weapon of offence, a blood-stained stone, as well as the mobile phone belonging to the deceased. The articles were seized" said SDPO Barbil Gangoli in a press meet.

## In a major reform, Government announces measures to deepen G-Sec market and facilitate greater Foreign Portfolio Investment (FPI) in equity segment

**Bhubaneswar:** In line with the Government's commitment to strengthen India's position as a leading global investment destination and to deepen the capital market, the Ministry of Finance has taken a series of measures aimed at enhancing the ease of investment for individual Persons Resident Outside India (PROIs) and Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs), and to attract stable long-term foreign capital flows.

Building on the recent initiatives to enhance ease of doing business in capital markets, the Government has undertaken further reforms to make foreign investment in equities and G-Secs more accessible, efficient, and globally competitive.

Liberalisation of investment by individual Persons Resident Outside India under the Foreign Exchange Management (Non-Debt Instrument) Rules, 2019

The Union Minister for Finance and Corporate Affairs announced in the Union Budget FY2026-27 that individual Persons Resident Outside India (PROI) will be permitted to invest in equity instruments of listed Indian companies through the Portfolio Investment Scheme which was hitherto available only to NRIs/OCIs; and the investment limit will be increased for an individual PROI under this scheme from

5% to 10% in any company, with an overall investment limit for all individual PROIs to 24%, from the current 10%.

To implement the same, Department of Economic Affairs (DEA) is notifying the Foreign Exchange Management (Non-Debt Instruments) (Third Amendment) Rules, 2026.

This notification will facilitate a more proactive mobilisation of foreign portfolio capital by leveraging the existing onboarding systems already in place for NRI/OCI investors. Simplified onboarding and reduced compliance requirements would further enhance ease of doing business, while attracting a broader base of relatively stable individual foreign investors. This will also support greater and more stable foreign inflows into Indian equity markets.

Review of the regulatory framework for FPI investment in Government securities

With the view to enhance participation by FPIs in G-Sec, the Government has decided to expand the list of specified securities under the Fully Accessible Route (FAR) to also include new issuances in Government securities in tenors of 15, 30 and 40 years as also Sovereign Green Bonds (SGrBs) in the tenors of FAR-eligible securities. Further, with respect to FPI investments under General Route, it has been decided to remove the three restrictions, viz. short-

term investment limit, concentration limit and the security-wise limit for investments by Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) in Government securities, while retaining the overall quantitative investment limit of 6 per cent of the outstanding stock of the Central Government securities and 2 per cent of the State Government securities (SGSs). The sub-categories of investment limits, viz. 'general' and 'long-term' will also be merged into a single limit for investment in Government securities and SGSs, respectively.

These measures will help in development of a smooth yield curve, and attract stable systematic inflow of long-term, patient foreign capital, including long-term investors such as pension funds, insurance companies, and sovereign wealth funds. This is also expected to boost foreign exchange inflows for the country.

Exempt interest and capital gains on G-Secs from tax Recognising the importance of a competitive tax regime in attracting global capital, the Government has decided to rationalise the tax treatment applicable to investments by FPIs in Government Securities, by exempting such investments from income tax on any interest or capital gain. This step will align the taxation on G-Secs with many comparable jurisdictions.

## Vedanta Aluminium's Solar Interventions Bring Light and Water Stability to Rural Odisha

**Bhubaneswar:** In the remote belts of Odisha, evening arrives abruptly. As daylight fades, activity begins to wind down, not out of routine, but necessity. Children put away their books earlier than they would like. Women rush to complete daily chores. Roads fade into long, unlit stretches that are difficult, and often unsafe to navigate.

Electricity exists, but not always when it is needed. Supply is inconsistent; outages are frequent, and in scattered habitations, access itself remains uneven. What appears as coverage on paper often translates into uncertainty in practice.

If electricity shapes the evening, water determines the day.

Across the region, access to drinking water remains a persistent challenge. During peak summer months, sources often run dry, and for many households, water still comes from a distance. Multiple trips and unpredictable supply continue to define daily life.

The burden falls most heavily on women. Water collection is not a one-time chore but a repeated task, physically demanding, time-consuming, and often limiting what else can be done in a

day. This is where energy and water begin to intersect.

When Power Becomes Access

Where electricity is unreliable, even basic systems struggle. Water infrastructure depends on power. Pumps fail during outages, and supply becomes erratic. What exists does not always work.

That is what makes decentralized solutions essential in regions like these.

Solar energy, in this context, becomes about reliability. It works where the grid falters and delivers at the point where it is needed.

Across Kalahandi, Rayagada, Sundergarh, Jharsuguda, and Koraput, Vedanta Aluminium has implemented decentralized solar interventions, installing over 700 solar-powered streetlights and more than 25 solar-powered borewells, together benefiting over 20,000 people by improving access to both reliable lighting and safe drinking water in remote habitations.

These interventions reflect a broader shift in how the company approaches sustainability, embedding clean energy within its operations and extending the same principles to

surrounding communities. In regions where conventional infrastructure struggles, this ensures solutions that are not just available, but dependable.

These are not large systems. They are local, visible fixes, lighting streets and public spaces, and ensuring water access without dependence on unstable power supply.

Shri Gunasingh Majhi, Sarpanch of Sunger Gram Panchayat, Rayagada district, said, "For years, our villages struggled with safe drinking water and basic lighting. Women had to walk long distances, and after sunset, movement became unsafe. Today, with solar borewells and streetlights, daily life has changed. Water is available closer to our homes, and the streets remain lit at night. That effort is gone, and we can use that time for other work."

Lighting doesn't just illuminate, it changes how spaces are used. It extends the usable day and restores a basic sense of security.

Water, Without the Distance

If lighting changes how people move, water access changes how they live. In villages where supply is uncertain, the day is

structured around collection, early mornings, repeated trips, and physical strain. It is work that rarely gets counted, but defines the day, especially for women. Solar-powered borewells change that equation at the source. By removing dependence on erratic electricity, they ensure consistent access to safe drinking water within the village itself. Not a distant well, not a seasonal source, but water that is available when needed.

For women, this shift is immediate, and deeply personal.

Pushpanjali Nath from Sriapali Village explains, "We used to walk far to get water, sometimes several times a day. It would take hours. Now the water is here. That effort is gone, and we can use that time for other work."

Beyond time and distance, it is also about certainty, especially for children.

Another resident, adds, "Earlier, we were never sure if the water we brought was clean, and our children used to fall sick frequently. Now, with water available here, it feels safer for them. That tension has reduced."

The Changes That Stay

For children, the impact shows up in quieter ways. Nandini Bag, a student of Khairkuni Anchalik High School, Kudaloi Gram Panchayat, says, "I used to hurry back home before it got dark because the roads were dark and felt unsafe. Now with the lights, we can walk back without fear, and I can study at night also." It is a small change, but one that reshapes both learning and confidence.

What This Really Changes

These are not large, sweeping transformations. They are smaller shifts, repeated every day, where effort reduces, access improves, and routines become less uncertain.

Vedanta Aluminium's interventions across these regions reflect a sustained effort to address such gaps through clean energy and community-led infrastructure. By combining solar lighting and water access solutions, the company is contributing to long-term improvements in safety, health, and everyday quality of life, where development is measured by its reliability on the ground.

community to Kuwait's development," it added. According to the Embassy, they also exchanged views on promoting community-led initiatives and enhancing people-to-people ties. On Tuesday, Prime Minister Narendra Modi held a phone call with Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-

Jaber Al-Sabah, Amir of the State of Kuwait and strongly condemned the latest attacks on Kuwait. "We had a detailed discussion on the ongoing conflict in West Asia. Strongly condemned attacks on Kuwait's sovereignty and territorial integrity. Reiterated our support for dialogue and

diplomacy for restoration of peace and stability at the earliest." PM Modi posted on X. PM Modi also appreciated the Kuwaiti leadership's continued efforts to ensure the safety and well-being of the Indian community in Kuwait. According to a statement released by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Kuwait, during the call, the Amir of Kuwait renewed the friendly Republic of India's condemnation of the "reprehensible and brazen Iranian attacks" on Kuwaiti lands and airspace, and its recent targeting of civilians and the building of Kuwait International Airport in a heinous assault that resulted in the killing of one member of the Indian community, with others injured. Ambassador Tripathi on Monday visited the Indian nationals, who were injured during the attack.

## Iran Targets US Defence Facilities, Announces Closing Strait Of Hormuz

Tehran, 11/6: The Iranian army said it launched drone attacks against the US Fifth Fleet in Bahrain on Thursday morning, adding that communications and radar facilities linked to the fleet's Patriot air-defence system were among the targets. The US Central Command said its forces conducted additional strikes against multiple Iranian targets earlier Thursday, describing the action as a response to Iran's "unwarranted and continued aggression." Amid the escalating confrontation, Iran's Khatam al-Anbiya Central Headquarters announced the closure of the Strait of Hormuz to all vessels, including oil tankers and commercial ships. Iranian authorities said the measure was necessary due to security risks posed by ongoing military tensions in the region, Xinhua

news agency reported. Iranian military officials warned that vessels attempting to transit the strategic waterway could be targeted. The latest exchange of attacks came despite reports that Tehran and Washington had recently explored possible peace proposals through Pakistani mediation in an effort to end the conflict. Iran also rejected US President Donald Trump's claim of having held a phone conversation with Iranian officials, calling it a "cover" to escape war. Meanwhile, Jordanian air defence systems and Royal Air Force fighter jets intercepted and shot down 20 missiles fired from Iran early Thursday morning, according to a Jordan Armed Forces statement on Thursday. The missiles were intercepted over the Azraq region in eastern Zarqa Governorate,

the statement said. It confirmed that the interception caused debris to fall, and no casualties or material damage were reported. Specialised military engineering teams have been deployed to handle unexploded ordnance. The Jordanian Armed Forces said it is closely monitoring ongoing regional developments and maintains the highest levels of combat readiness. The military added that it remains committed to protecting the Kingdom's airspace and defending its national sovereignty, vowing that it will not permit any violation of Jordanian airspace by any party. Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) said on Thursday that it struck the US al-Azraq base in Jordan with ballistic missiles in response to US attacks on Iran.

## UAE And Saudi Arabia Condemn Iran's Attack On Bahrain, Kuwait And Jordan

Abu Dhabi, 11/6: The United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Saudi Arabia on Thursday condemned the latest Iranian attacks on Bahrain, Kuwait and Jordan. "The United Arab Emirates has condemned in the strongest terms the renewed hostile missile and drone attacks by Iran that targeted the Kingdom of Bahrain, the state of Kuwait and the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan," stated the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA) of the UAE.

Reaffirming the UAE's solidarity with Bahrain, Kuwait and Jordan and its support for safeguarding their security and stability, the statement added that these hostile attacks constitute a flagrant violation of the sovereignty of the "three brotherly nations" and a threat to their security and stability. Calling for de-escalation and avoidance of any further escalation, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Saudi Arabia stated: "The Foreign Ministry expresses the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's strongest condemnation of the repeated



Iranian attacks targeting the brotherly Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan, the brotherly Kingdom of Bahrain, and the brotherly State of Kuwait, and of the continued violations of the sovereignty of these brotherly states, which further escalate tensions in the region." Iran's Islamic Revolution Guard Corps (IRGC) said Thursday that it had launched missile attacks on the US military bases in Jordan, Kuwait and Bahrain in retaliation to the US strikes. According to statements

carried by the IRGC's official outlet, Sepah News, Iran's aerospace force targeted facilities at the US al-Azraq Air Base in Jordan, including hangars housing fighter aircraft and command-and-control centres. The IRGC claimed the strike inflicted significant damage on the targeted sites. The force also said it struck US military facilities at Ali Al Salem and Ahmad al-Jaber air bases in Kuwait, as well as Sheikh Isa airbase in Bahrain, in two waves of attacks.

## Indian Embassy Coordinating With Omani Navy To Evacuate MT Jalveer Crew

Muscat, 11/6: The Indian Embassy in Muscat on Thursday confirmed that efforts are underway to evacuate Indian nationals from MT Jalveer to Shinas Port with the support of the Royal Navy of Oman. "Evacuation of crew from MT Jalveer to Shinas port is being coordinated with assistance from Royal Navy of Oman, and shall soon be complete," the Indian mission posted on X. Addressing a press briefing on Thursday, Additional Secretary, Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways, Mukesh Mangal said that all 20 Indian seafarers on board MT Jalveer are safe after the vessel came under attack off the Shinas port in Oman. He said that India remains concerned over repeated disruptions to commercial shipping, while reiterating the importance of secure and uninterrupted navigation through international waters in line with international law. "Today, we also learned that the commercial vessel MT Jalveer, a Guinea-Bissau-



flagged vessel, came under attack off Shinas port in Oman. The vessel has twenty Indian crew members on board, and all are reportedly safe. Our mission in Oman is closely monitoring the situation and coordinating with the Omani authorities for the safe evacuation of the Indian crew," Mangal said. "The continuing incidents affecting commercial shipping in the region are deeply concerning. We reiterate the importance of ensuring the safety

and security of seafarers and of maintaining free and unimpeded navigation and commerce through international waterways in accordance with international law," he added. Meanwhile, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said that New Delhi places the highest priority on the safety of Indian seafarers and voiced concern over the repeated attacks on shipping in West Asia. Stressing that incidents are linked

to ongoing conflict in the region, he reiterated India's call for dialogue and diplomacy to restore peace and stability at the earliest. "We have seen several incidents involving Indian seafarers in West Asia over the last few days. We attach the highest importance to the welfare and well-being of our seafaring community, and there is no need to re-emphasize this point. Yesterday, we condemned the attack on a ship off the coast of Oman in which, unfortunately, three Indian nationals lost their lives. We had summoned the US Chargé d'Affaires to register a strong protest," Jaiswal said, speaking at the press briefing. "The continuing attacks on shipping in the region are deeply worrisome and are a direct consequence of the ongoing conflict there. These attacks must cease, and we also call for dialogue and diplomacy to ensure an early return to peace and stability in the region," he added.

## 47 Killed, Over 346,000 Affected After Strong Quake In Philippines

Manila, 11/6: At least 47 people were killed, 31 missing, and 688 injured after a magnitude 7.8 earthquake struck off the southern coast of Mindanao, the Philippines, on Monday, said the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) on Thursday. The NDRRMC said the quake has affected more than 75,300 households, or over 346,000 people, and more than 45,000 affected residents have been displaced, with over 12,600 houses sustaining damage. The quake also triggered 45 related incidents, mainly landslides, reports Xinhua news agency. The council added that the earthquake affected the operation of 45 road sections, eight bridge sections, one airport, and two seaports, as well as the agriculture, husbandry and fishery industries. Power services were affected across 48 cities and municipalities. The Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology said the tectonic earthquake occurred at 7:37 a.m. local time at a depth of 33 km, with the epicentre 32 km southwest of the coast of Maasin town in Sarangani province on Mindanao Island. Earlier, Junie Castillo, spokesperson for the



Philippines' Office of Civil Defence, said 10 victims were reported in South Cotabato's General Santos, a port city with a population of over 700,000, and at least 12 people remain missing so far. The deaths were caused by falling debris, building collapse and landslides. The Philippine National Police earlier said that no fewer than 134 people were injured. A two-story school building in General Santos collapsed with students trapped inside, and authorities said they are verifying details of the incident. Online videos show university and restaurant buildings collapsed in disaster-hit areas. Some commercial facilities sustained

structural damage, with signs falling and window panes shattered. Local residents rushed outdoors to seek safety. The powerful earthquake hit shortly after schools across the Philippines started reopening following the summer break. Surveillance footage from several schools captured violent shaking during the quake. Teachers and students either evacuated urgently or took shelter under desks. The number of schools affected by the earthquake has risen to 8,642 across 43 divisions in six regions, local media reported, citing figures from the Department of Education.

## India's Pharma Market Likely To Reach \$120-130 Bn By 2030: Report

New Delhi, 11/6: India's pharmaceutical market is expected to grow to \$120-130 billion by 2030 from an estimated \$55 billion in 2025, and pharmaceutical exports have crossed \$30 billion in FY25, a report said on Thursday. The report from ASSOCHAM said India supplies around 20 per cent of the world's generic medicines by volume and contributes over half of UNICEF's vaccine procurement requirements, underlining the country's role in global healthcare supply chains. The next phase of growth will be driven by innovation, advanced therapies, artificial intelligence led drug discovery, biosimilars and regulatory excellence, according to ASSOCHAM Secretary General Saurabh Sanyal. Sanyal said that India has built a strong reputation as a global supplier of affordable medicines and vaccines, due to its strong manufacturing capabilities, scientific talent and policy ecosystem. He also emphasised the need for higher investment in research and development, stronger industry-academia collaboration, future-ready talent and globally aligned regulatory standards. The industry chamber expects future growth to be driven



by a global patent cliff on biologics, accelerating demand for affordable advanced therapies, advances in artificial intelligence-driven drug discovery, and geopolitical realignment of pharmaceutical supply chains. The report highlighted that biologics generating over \$40 billion in annual revenues are expected to lose exclusivity between 2025 and 2029, creating significant opportunities for biosimilar manufacturers. The global biosimilars market, valued

at \$39.6 billion in 2025, is projected to reach \$151.6 billion by 2033. India's bioeconomy has exceeded \$150 billion and is projected to reach \$300 billion by 2030, with biologics and biopharma expected to be key growth drivers. Government initiatives such as Biopharma SHAKTI, Bio-RIDE and the BioE3 Policy are helping create an integrated ecosystem linking research, manufacturing and commercialisation, the report noted. The report outlined five

strategic priorities for India Pharma 2030—global regulatory alignment and quality leadership; translational science and innovation financing; biologics and cell and gene therapy manufacturing leadership; pharma talent and research capability development; and domestic access, innovation adoption and Global South leadership. India's pharmaceutical exports will expand to \$75-80 billion by 2030 if these priority areas are focused, the industry body noted.

## Sensex, Nifty End Lower Amid Rising West Asia Tensions; IT Stocks Drag Indices Down

Mumbai, 11/6: Indian equity benchmark indices ended a volatile trading session lower on Thursday as investor sentiment weakened amid escalating geopolitical tensions in West Asia following fresh military action by the United States against Iran. The Nifty closed 53.35 points, or 0.23 per cent, lower at 23,161.60, while the Sensex declined 150.63 points, or 0.20 per cent, to settle at 73,832.55. Commenting on Nifty technical outlook, experts said that the 23,300-23,400 zone now acts as an important immediate resistance area. "A sustained move above this range would be required to improve sentiment and support a recovery toward the 23,550 region," an analyst stated. "On the downside, the index is currently hovering near the crucial 23,100 support zone. Holding above this level will be important to prevent further weakness," a market expert mentioned. Market participants remained cautious after reports emerged that the United States had intensified its military offensive against Iran. US President Donald Trump said Tehran had ample time to negotiate a deal with Washington but failed to do so. He warned that Iran would now have to face the



consequences, adding that the US would strike the country "very hard". Further adding to concerns, Iran announced the closure of the strategically important Strait of Hormuz following the US military strikes. The development raised fears of potential disruptions to global oil supplies and heightened uncertainty across financial markets. Among the Nifty constituents, Infosys and Eternal emerged as the top laggards, weighing on the benchmark index. The weakness in technology stocks also dragged the broader IT sector lower. Broader markets witnessed sharper selling pressure, with the Nifty MidCap index ending 0.81 per cent lower and the Nifty

SmallCap index declining 0.67 per cent. On the sectoral front, the Nifty IT, Nifty Consumer Durable and Nifty Chemical indices recorded the steepest losses. In contrast, the Nifty Media, Nifty Private Bank and Nifty Pharma indices outperformed the broader market and managed to limit the overall decline. Analysts said investors are closely monitoring developments in West Asia, as any further escalation could impact global crude oil prices and risk sentiment across equity markets. After two days of gains, the Indian Rupee depreciated due to fresh dollar demand driven by forward maturities and a recovery in the dollar index amid safe-haven flows.

## Gold, Silver Prices Fall Up To 2 Pc Amid West Asia Tensions

Mumbai, 11/6: Gold and silver prices traded lower on Thursday, with precious metals falling by up to 2 per cent amid escalating tensions in the West Asia conflict. On the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX), gold futures (August) declined as much as 1 per cent or Rs 1,573 to hit an intraday low of Rs 1,46,444 as of around 12 pm. The yellow metal was trading at Rs 1,47,860, down 0.11 per cent or Rs 157. It touched an intraday high of Rs 1,48,089, up 0.04 per cent or Rs 72 from the previous close. On the other hand, silver futures (July) were trading at Rs 2,34,500, down Rs 1,005 or 0.43 per cent. The white metal touched an intraday low of Rs 2,30,493, declining 2.12 per cent during the session so far. It recorded an intraday high of Rs 2,35,402, down 0.04 per cent or Rs 103 from the previous close. Earlier in the day, gold and silver opened at Rs 1,46,518 and Rs 2,31,671, respectively, on the MCX. In international markets, precious metals also remained under pressure. COMEX silver was trading at \$63.90, down over 1.29 per cent, while COMEX gold was trading 0.68 per cent lower



at \$4,105.30 per ounce. According to commodity analysts, precious metals remained under pressure as investors assessed the latest developments in the West Asia conflict. Gold stabilised near multi-month lows after the US military confirmed the completion of its latest strikes on Iran, raising expectations that diplomatic negotiations could resume. They said easing safe-haven demand, coupled with expectations that US interest rates could remain higher for longer, weighed on bullion prices. Higher interest

rates reduce the appeal of non-yielding assets such as gold and silver. Market participants also continued to monitor inflationary pressures stemming from rising energy prices and their potential impact on the US Federal Reserve's policy path. Meanwhile, crude oil prices surged sharply, with Brent crude rising over 2 per cent to trade near \$95 per barrel, while US West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude climbed 4 per cent to \$93.64 per barrel.

## BMI Pegs India's Growth At 6.6 Pc In FY27 Despite Global Challenges

New Delhi, 11/6: India's GDP growth is pegged at 6.6 per cent for the financial year 2026-27, which is above the country's decadal growth average, and will enable the country to retain its tag as the world's fastest-growing economy amid the adverse impact triggered by the West Asia crisis, according to a forecast by Fitch Group company BMI. BMI's projection is in line with RBI's 6.6 per cent growth estimates for 2026-27. India clocked a robust growth rate of 7.7 per cent in 2025-26 despite the global challenges. "Looking ahead, we continue to expect 6.6 per cent GDP growth in FY 2026-27. Our projection represents a visible slowdown from FY2025-26's 7.7 per cent pace but exceeds India's average 6.1 per cent per annum growth rate over the last decade," it said. BMI attributed the slow growth rate this fiscal to three factors. First, the impact of last year's GST reforms on domestic consumption is likely to wane. The GST reforms implemented in September 2025 caused a consumption boom in the December quarter of FY26. Thereafter, consumption growth



fell by 1.1 percentage points to 7.1 per cent year-on-year in the March quarter of FY26. The report also expects higher inflation, which is expected to touch 5.3 per cent in FY27, to dampen consumption growth amid supply chain disruptions due to the choking of the Strait of Hormuz through which 20 per cent of the world's energy exports transit during normal times.

Thirdly, BMI expects investment growth to slow during the financial year. "This slowdown is not due to our new forecast of an accumulative 50 basis points (bps) rate hike by the RBI in FY 2026-27, since the effect on growth will primarily be felt during FY2027-28." BMI said the currently low level of short-term interest rates following the RBI's 125 bps rate cut during 2025 will support the

economy through the ongoing energy crisis. The exchange rate of the rupee vis-a-vis the US dollar is expected to hover in the range of 95.1 during the current calendar year. The rupee's depreciation from its average level of 87 against the greenback in 2025 will support export competitiveness, offsetting the drag on GDP from the Iran conflict's terms-of-trade shock, the report added.

## West Asia Conflict Could Push Crude Oil Prices To \$150 Per Barrel

New Delhi, 11/6: Global crude oil prices could surge to as high as \$150 per barrel if hostilities between the US and Iran resume in earnest, according to a report. According to analysis by Oslo-headquartered energy research and intelligence firm Rystad Energy, which said the latest escalation between the US and Iran has pushed the April ceasefire to its most difficult moment so far, triggering a rise in oil prices and a decline in financial markets, including US equities. According to the report, as much as 11.8 million barrels per day (bpd) of oil production remains shut in across six Gulf producers, making the conflict the most significant supply disruption seen in modern energy markets. "At this stage, it is too early to say whether the current escalation marks a full resumption of hostilities or a dangerous but



still containable episode," said Jorge Leon, Senior Vice President and Head of Geopolitical Analysis at Rystad Energy. He noted that uncertainty surrounding the conflict was reflected in oil price movements, with Brent front-month crude rising sharply to around \$94.5 per barrel before easing back towards \$93 per

barrel. Leon said the immediate impact of the disruption could be moderated by record releases from strategic petroleum reserves, lower crude imports by China and the continued movement of around 5 million bpd of crude through Saudi Arabia's Yanbu export route, bypassing the Strait of Hormuz.

"The direction of travel is now more uncertain, and the next few days will be critical in determining whether diplomacy can reassert itself or whether the conflict moves into a more sustained escalation cycle," Leon said. In addition, the report stated that probability of a near-term diplomatic agreement has diminished from Rystad Energy's earlier assessment of around 40 per cent a few weeks ago. As a result, oil price volatility is expected to remain elevated until there is clearer evidence that the ceasefire can hold or that diplomatic efforts regain momentum. According to the report, the West Asia conflict has already erased around 1 billion barrels of cumulative crude supply from global markets in the three months since the first shots were fired.

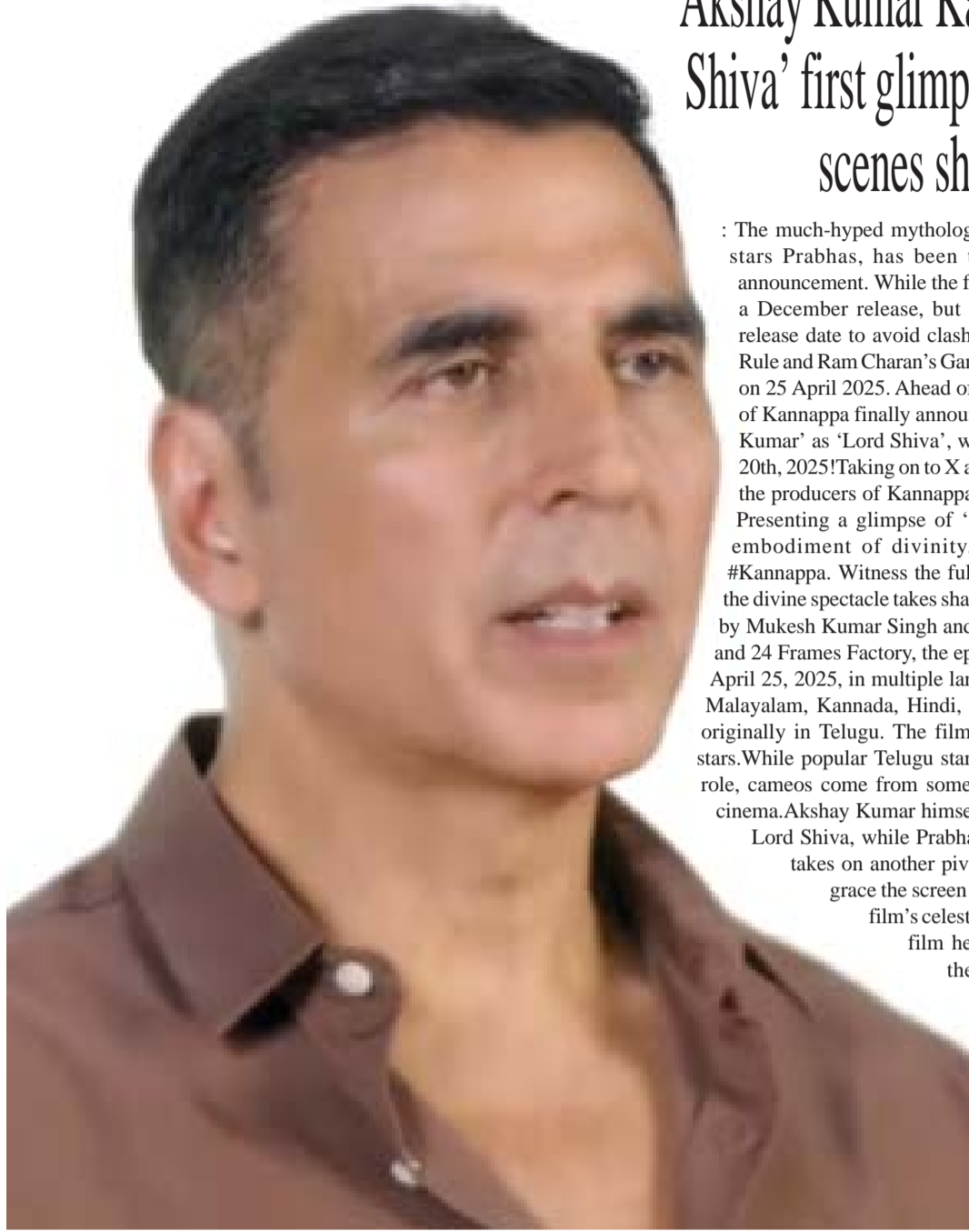
## Centre Removes Excise Duty On Petrol With Up To 30 Pc Ethanol Blending

New Delhi, 11/6: The government has exempted petrol blended with higher levels of ethanol from excise duty, including fuel variants containing 22 per cent, 25 per cent, 27 per cent and 30 per cent ethanol, according to a notification issued by the Ministry of Finance on Thursday. As per the notification, excise duty has been set at nil for ethanol-blended motor spirit conforming to Bureau of Indian Standards specifications, covering blends where ethanol content ranges from 22 per cent to 30 per cent by volume. The exemption has been granted under Section 5A of the Central Excise Act, 1944, it said. The revised structure includes E22, E25, E27 and E30 petrol, defined as mixtures of motor spirit (petrol) and ethanol in specified proportions, with applicable central, state, Union



Territory or integrated taxes on ethanol and duty-paid petrol components. The amendment follows India's push to expand ethanol blending in petrol as part of its broader biofuel policy aimed at reducing crude oil imports and promoting domestic renewable fuel usage. The government has

steadily increased ethanol blending levels in petrol in recent years, supported by policy changes under the National Policy on Biofuels and corresponding targets advanced to 2025-26. In a separate development, the government recently launched E85 fuel for compatible flex-fuel vehicles.

### Badminton: Sindhu, Tanvi Race Into Australian Open Quarterfinals

Sydney, 11/6: Two-time Olympic medallist PV Sindhu and teenager Tanvi Sharma sailed into the quarterfinals of the women's singles event at the Australian Badminton Open tournament here on Thursday. World No. 10 Sindhu got the better of her younger compatriot and world No. 39 Isharani Baruah 22-20, 21-12 in 42 minutes. She will face Chinese Taipei's Chen Su-yu in the quarter-finals for a place in her second semi-final of the year after the Malaysia Open. The third-seeded Indian survived a challenge from Isharani in a tie-break opening game before dominating the second to book her spot in the quarter-finals. Elsewhere, Tanvi Sharma registered a convincing 21-13, 21-15 win over senior compatriot Malvika Bansod in another all-Indian contest. The win propelled the 17-year-old Tanvi into her second quarterfinal of the year. She will face three-time world champion and top seed Akane Yamaguchi of Japan in a daunting quarter-final match. In



another action, Tanya Hemanth's campaign came to an end after a 12-21, 15-21 loss to the second seed and world No. 8 Pornpawee Chochuwong of Thailand. In the men's doubles, MR Arjun and Hariharan Amsakarunan stayed alive with a comfortable 21-17, 21-7 win against Michael Owen and Dylan Soedjasa of New Zealand. Arjun and Hariharan are the only Indians remaining in the men's doubles discipline after Achutaditya Rao Doddavarapu and Arjun Reddy Pochana suffered an exit after losing 21-15, 21-15 to the local pair of Kanki Igawa and Ooi Ye Hern in the opening round. Satwiksairaj Rankireddy-Chirag Shetty, India's top-ranked doubles team, skipped the BWF Super 500 meet on account of the shoulder injury. Satwik suffered last week in Indonesia. India's mixed doubles challenge at the Australian Badminton Open ended after Dhruv Rawat and Manisha Keer lost 21-19, 21-18 to Japan's Akira Koga and Natsu Saito.

### Spanish Winger Lamine Yamal Takes On Global UNICEF Humanitarian Role Before World Cup 2026
